

that the writer had partly overheard a conversation in a railway train inducing him to the belief that some attempt at assassination in the Chamber of Deputies was being organized. Nicotora immediately forwarded the letter to the Prefect of Police and Minister of the Interior. The *Observatore Romano* asks if this is the first amplified amplification of Gen. Garibaldi's suggestion that the people should hiss the deputies on leaving the chamber. The representatives of the Irish riflemen at Dollymount, to-morrow, will be Fenton, Young, Wm. Rigby, John Rigby, Milner and Joynt, with Coghlan and Murphy as reserves. The Americans were at ranges at noon trying rifles and sights. A strong southwest wind was blowing across the range, the weather dull, lowering individual shooting. At 900 yards the range was excellent. The Irish team came an hour later. The weather promises badly for to-morrow. An ugly storm seems to be brewing. The *Times* understands that the Government has determined to recommend that the House on Tuesday adopt a general resolution admitting re-elected members to affirm who may claim to do so instead of taking the oath. It is thought that the liberals who were absent when the division last week took place will support the resolution, and that the conservatives and liberals of last weeks majority will be willing to let it pass. The validity of such a resolution would be liable to be tested by action at law against any member not being a Quaker, etc., who ventured to sit and vote under its authority. General Skobloff's troops have had an encounter with the Tekkes. No details are published. The Russian floating battery *Kremel* which was proceeding to the Pacific, came into collision with the Danish steamer in the Gulf of Finland. The *Kremel* was severely injured and put in at Helsingfors for repairs. The announcement of the appointment of Admiral Lessovski to the chief command of the Pacific squadron is confirmed. The gravest apprehensions are said to be felt at the British embassy in Constantinople, relative to the turn of affairs in Albania. The Albanian committee has dispatched 1,500 men to Daligiris. Much notice has been taken in Berlin of an article in the *Paris Temps* affecting to discard all responsibility on the part of France in the event of Turkey refusing to obey the voice of Europe. It points to England as ultimate executor of the will of the powers as having excited them to express it in conference. The master cotton spinners of Mossley refused an advance of five per cent. wages, and the spinners and weavers struck. Eight thousand persons are out of employment. A *Cabul* dispatch says: The answer to the British ultimatum has been received from Abdurrahman Khan. Its tenor is said to raise doubts in regard to the Khan's sincerity. Abdurrahman seems to ignore the fact that the British have informed him that Candahar has been forming as a separate province. He states in his letter that he is to rule over exactly the same territory as his grandfather Dost Mohamed. In other respects the letter is satisfactory. He proposes to advance to Parivan, northern Kohistan, and there conclude final arrangements. A letter from Corfu, states that ten English officers engaged an interpreter and proceeded to the main land, ostensibly to inquire into the feelings of the inhabitants of Janiva and that district relative to the annexation to Greece, but it is thought really to make a strategical survey. The French Budget committee voted 750,000 francs for the survey of a railway from Senegal to the Niger, Western Africa, and a cable from Iede point to Cape Verde. Six thousand Communists, transported in 1871, have returned. Those free from criminal antecedent have resumed full political rights. Scarcely five hundred remain in New Caledonia. Such of them as had seriously incurred the forfeiture of their political rights will still be under disabilities. Scarcely two hundred will be able to aspire to seats in the Chambers or local bodies, and only twenty of these are actually notorious, including Rochefort, Felix Piat, Jules Vallast, Blanqui and Trinquette. Telegraph communication with Buenos Ayres is entirely cut off. The *St. Petersburg Gazette* announces that the visit of the Chinese ambassador to France is again postponed by China to gain time for war preparations.

Chili, while making things exceedingly hot for the Peruvians, has the coolness to demand \$200,000,000 from them as consequential damages arising out of the war. A chilly proposition indeed for Peru. During three weeks while French workmen were on strike, the amount of salaries which they lost is estimated at seven million francs. Besides this, trade was so disturbed that the loss to the community was much greater. Strikes scarcely ever pay.
