OBITUARY.

NEBEKER.—Elder Peter Nebeker, of Willard City, died at that place on the 25th ult., after suffering ten days from acute peritonitis, an ailment which had attacked him several times before.

Deceased was born Aug. 25, 1821, in Newport, Delaware, and when seven years of age removed with his parents to Indiana. Here he heard the Gospel, and at the time of the exodus of the Saints from Illinois he joined their ranks and was baptized at Garden Grove in the Spring of 1847. About the same time he was married to Miss Elizabeth Davis, and during the same year came to Utah. His wife died in 1851, leaving him with two children, and in the following year he married her sister, Mary Maria Davis.

During those early years of Utah's settlement Brother Nebeker was one of the most active of the minute men in guarding against attacks of Indians, etc., and in the year 1855 he was sent to the White Mountains as a missionary among the Indians. In 1863 and again in 1866, he journeyed to the Missouri River in charge of trains to bring home companies of immigrants, and in that capacity displayed great energy. In 1868 he went upon a mission to England, where he labored faithfully for two years in proclaiming the Gospel. In 1876 he removed his family from the Nineteenth Ward of this city, which had been his home from the time that ward was organized, to Willard, Box Elder County, and there established himself upon a farm. While a resident of this city he filled various offices of trust, such as City Councilor and member of the High Council, and was faithful in all his duties. He lived an active, useful life, was highly respected by his acquaintances, was a devoted Latter-day Saint, good husband and kind father, and has reared a large family of children to be faithful members in the Church, and ambitious to emulate their father's virtues.—C O M.

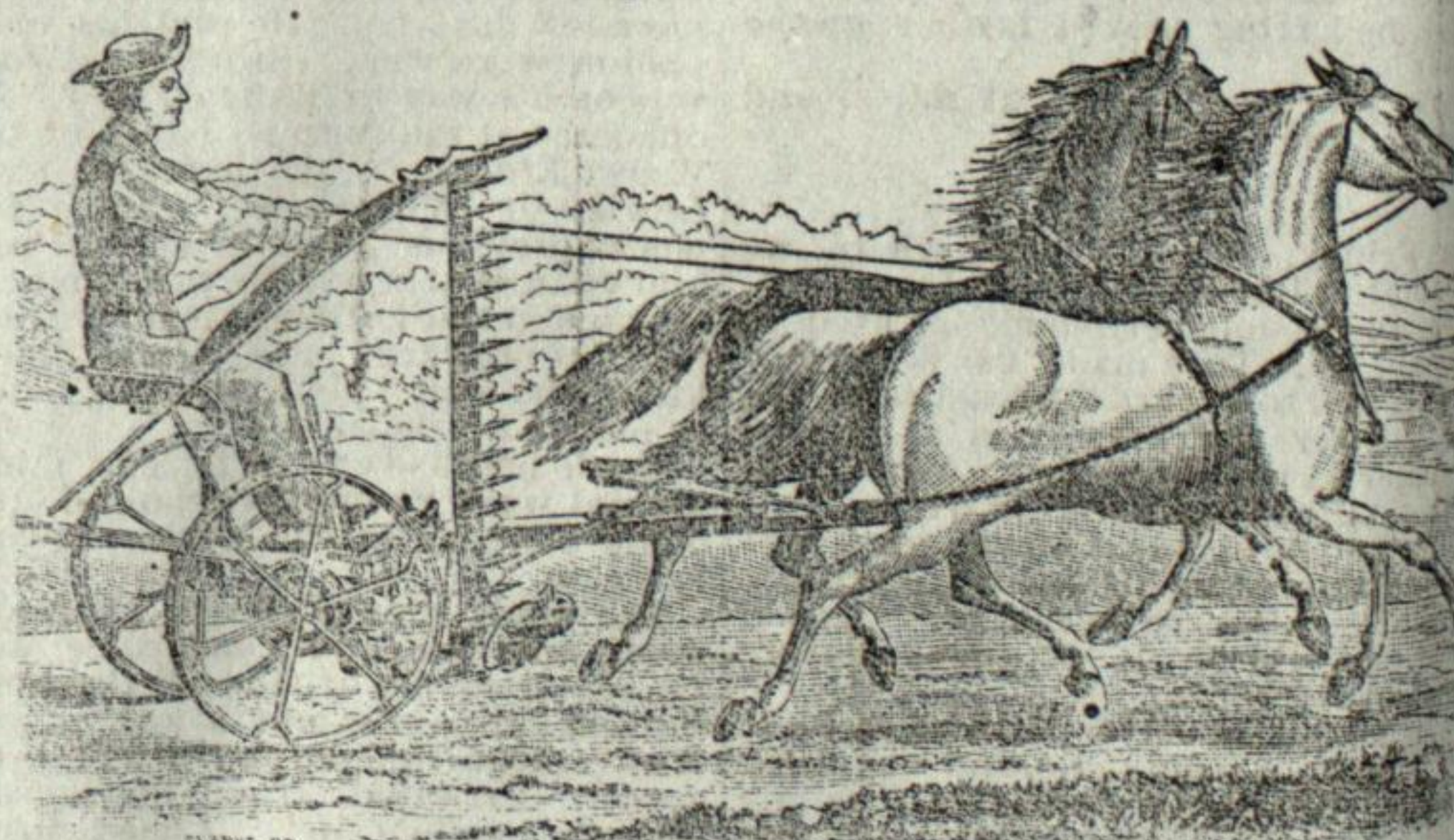
