CHEAP SUBSTITUTE FOR RADIUM FOUND

New York. Oct 11 -Since the discov-ery of radium and its value as a thera-peutic agent, laboratory workers have been striving to find an efficient substi-

then striving to find an efficient substi-tute for this costly adjunct to the outfit of physicians and surgeons, and Dr. J. B. Shober seems to have found one that is cheap and reliable. The discovery resulted from his in-vestigations of the radio-active prop-erty of occoanut charcoal. Dr. Shober suys he passed a slow current of air through a celluloid tube eight inches long and three-quarters of an inch in diameter, coated on the inside with a colludion solution containing one milli-gram of strong radium broundle, into a porrelain vessel containing a quan-tity of occoanut charcoal. At the end of a week he found the tharcoal strong-by radio-active, discharging his electro-scope more rapidly than would a speci-men of high grade pitch blende ore. He then spread a quantity of this charcoal over a key on an X-ray plate and ob-tained a strong picture of the key after an exponence of four days.
