The mines never premised so well and the railroad movement which is to give Southern Utah swift and cheap transportation, guarantees a daily news-paper in Beaver City, if the people were of the truly enterprising class. Every furnace, mill, store and professional and business man in

Southern Utah ought to have been advertised in the columns of the Daily Square Dealer. A country without a daily paper is too slow for business men and capital, and the people of southern Utah will be convinced of this fact when they shall find their mineral and other resources neglected.
