Evolution of the Short Throw to Catch Runner Off the Base.

PREVENTS SCORING RUN.

Allows Runner to Reach Second but Generally Catches Man Off Third Base-How it is Done.

Of the various problems that are presented is the one where a baserunner may attempt to steal a base and whether or not to try to prevent it is one of the most complicated. A puzzling feature of this important point of the game and one that invariabley causes comment among the spectators is the ease with which a runner generally achieves a steal of second base with a teammate on third and none out.

of second base with a teammate on third and none out. This play has resulted in the evolution of the short throw, one of the best of baseball tactics, and a play that has been developed to a high state of eff-ciency by some catchers. The idea of a runner stealing from first to second with a man on third is to draw a throw and allow the runner on third to score during the resultant putout or attempt to retire. Different managers held various ideas about the wisdom of taking a certain putout at the expense of a run. Some instruct their catchers in such cases to be guided by the score and to throw to second if their team is behind on the score board. The short throw, however, while it al-lows the runner to reach second safely. usually results as intended—in catching the runner at third in an attempt to sore on the play. It is not a throw to be relayed to the pitcher.
