A session of the Utah Legislature has been held under the operation of the Edmunds law without any response whatever to its requirements. That Legislature was composed of monog-amists in practice, but who were at the same time polygamists in theory, as their work shows. Shall we now falter or give way, or become weak in the knees, or tremble in the heart when we see this attitude so clearly defined? God ferbid."

For instance, when there is considerable sulphuric acid or a large quantity of lime present, there may be fears entertained with respect to the constant use of the wa-ter. Magnesis may de held in solu-tion in too great amount, and some-times silica and iron oxide are in ex-cess of the limit for health.
