Commissioner Skeen reported that complaints have been made to him of several accidents occuring in Ogden canyon because of automobiles travel-ing through the same. The matter of investigation the same. investigating the power of the board to prohibit the automobile travel in the canyon was referred to Commissioner Hon. L. B. Adams declined to act as delegate to the Trans-Mississippi Con-gress at Cripple Creek and Hon. Edwin Dix was appointed in his stead.

OGDEN CITY COUNCIL.

The City Council met last evening and transacted the following business:

The committee on public buildings and grounds advised the council that the best interests of the city and free public library would be conserved by xchanging the original gift of land on Union square for a piece of property 265 by 141 feet on the same corner and ecommended that the mayor and city. recorder execute and deliver a deed to said property to the library board. The report was adopted and the mayor and rder were so authorized.

The board of equalization and review in the matter of opening Twentleth street reported that they had met the requisite time and no change had been made in the assessment. They also rec-ommended that the tax of \$125 against the property owners, one-half of the cost of grading the street, be remitted to each individual who will present a deed to the property used in opening the street, the tax assessed for the pur-chase of the land being exactly offset by the amount of money to be paid by the city for the land condemned. They also recommended that the city attorney be instructed to prepare the nec essary deeds. The report was adopted. Sanitary Inspector Watkins reported that there were three cases of scarlet. fever in the city, but none of smallpox or diphtheria.

Street Supervisor Sanders reported the street expenditures for the past quarter to have been \$2,754.23, and in the water supply department, \$1,358.75. Poll taxes amounting to \$1,530 had been col-lected and expended. The city recorder called attention to a number of unslot machine licenses which the owners desired a refund. Re-

ferred to the committee on laws. The city recorder also called atten-tion to the merchants' license and asked ouncil to instruct him how to enforce the collection. The following res-clution was introduced and adopted:

Resolved, That the mayor and city attorney are hereby called upon to fully and emphatically enforce the merlicence ordinar

Attorney H. R. Macmillan advised the council to reconsider their action on the claim of H. P. McCardle and to pay said claim, as the city could not hope to win the case. The claim was ordered paid.

VETERAN GONE TO REST. Demise of Mrs. Margaret M. Beck-

stead Egbert.

Special Correspondence. West Jordan, Salt Lake Co., July 8.--At the residence of W. B. Beckstead at South Jordan, Salt Lake Co., Utah, Margaret M. Beckstead Egbert dk-d July 1st. She was the daughter of Alexander and Catherine Beckstead. She was born in Dundas Co., Ont., Canada, Dec. 9, 1823. She joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Canada; with her parents she came to the United States in 1838, with the first company of Saints that left Canada with Christopher Merkley and Alexander Beckstead. Before they reached the gathering place of the Saints they were surrounded by a mob saints they were sorrounded by a moto at Mt. Pisgah. The Prophet Joseph with a company of fifty met came to their relief and they settled in Adams Co., Mo. She married Samuel Egbert April 18, 1839, and she with her husband then motod to Hancok Co. Illingis seven The ross, and she wild her husband then moved to Hancock Co., Illinois, seven miles, below Nauvoo, Here they re-mained until after the martyrdom of the Prophet and his brother Hyrum. After the burning by the mob they then moved to Council Bluffs, remain-ing there two years and crossed the ing there two years, and crossed the plains in 1849. They settled on the west side of the Jordan river at West Jor-dan in October of the same year. There were but three families living there that winter. She was the mother of 14 children, 10 of whom are living, 5 hoys and 5 girls. She has 95 grandchildren, 67 great-grandchildren, and 3 great-greatgrandchildren, making five generations before her death. She passed through the grasshopper and cricket troubles, and moved south in 1858 as far as Provo but returned in the fall to West Jordan, where she passed the remainder of her days. She lived and died a faithful Latter-day Saint, leaving many friends to mourn her departure.
