The reduction is due, first to the loss of plants by im-proper irrigation for the germination and early growth of the winter varieties, followed by an open and somewhat variable winter; and second to the drouth, which prevailed with great severity in the North and East States. This reduction, as averaged from our local returns, appears to be about four-teen per cent. The average quality of the crop is better than that of 1869. The Pacific Coast reports are variable. Some counties in California make the quality superior, while others report injury from rust, and inferiority from matur-ity of grain blighted by drouth.
