Funeral services over the remains of Miss Jennie Summerhays, daughter of Joseph W. and Sarah Berrett Summerhays, were held in Forest Dale Assembly hall yesterday at 1 p. m. The hall was filled with relatives and sympathizing friends. The stand was beautifully decorated in white, and with flowers and potted plants, and the floral offerings were as numerous as they were beautiful.

FOR PROTECTION OF FRUIT INTERESTS.

Rules and Regulations Promulgated by State Board of Horticulture.

DUTIES OF COUNTY INSPECTORS

Shipments of Nursery Stock Must be Inspected Before Delivery—Combating Diseases and Insect Pests.

In accordance with section 10 of an enactment of the sixth Legislative Assembly of the State of Utah, entitled, "An act creating a state board of horticulture, providing for county fruit tree inspectors, defining their duties, providing for the publication and promulgation of their reports, defining the duties of orchardists and nurserymen and repealing chapter 194, Laws of Utah, 1903," approved March 9, 1935, and in force on and after that date, a meeting of the state board of horticulture was held in Salt Lake City, April 6-10, 1935, when the rules and regulations given below were adopted and promulgated for the protection and disinfection of orchards, nurseries, etc., and are therefore binding upon all fruit growers, fruit dealers, nurserymen and importers and shippers of nursery stock, and upon every owner, possessor or occupant of any orchard or land where trees are grown within this state.

In submitting the regulations, remedial and formulae adopted by the state board of horticulture for the extermination of pests injurious to fruit and destructive to trees and plant life and to prevent the importation and spread of insects and diseases detrimental to the horticultural interests of Utah, the cooperation of all persons interested is solicited in carrying out the important work of protecting the fruit industry of the state.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

Rule 1—It shall be the duty of every owner, possessor or occupant of an orchard or land where trees, vines or shrubs are grown within this state, to keep the same free from insects and diseases, and to keep the same clean of all decayed and fallen fruit.

Rule 2—The owner or owners of any nursery or nurseries shall disinfect all their nursery stock before the removal of the same from the premises for sale, gift, distribution or transportation, by the use of hydrocyanic acid gas, as given in Formula No. 4.

Rule 3—Importations of home grown nursery stock, unaccompanied by a certificate of fumigation as required by rule 2, shall be held in quarantine at the home of the importer or grower, until such time as the state board of horticulture shall be satisfied of the fact that such stock is free from insects or diseases.

Rule 4—Any member of the state board of horticulture, or county horticultural inspector may give a certificate of inspection to any nursery stock within his district or county, has been fumigated with hydrocyanic acid gas when it shall be proved to the satisfaction of such officer that said stock has been so treated, and a certificate shall be given by any officer stating that any nursery stock is free from insects or diseases.

Rule 5—It shall be the duty of each county horticultural inspector to examine all nursery stock received in his county or district and see that it is accompanied by a certificate of fumigation, and if not so accompanied, he shall refuse to receive the same, and if he receives the same, he shall report the same to the state board of horticulture.

Rule 6—All importations or shipments of trees, shrubs or vines shall be accompanied by a certificate of inspection, and if not so accompanied, they shall be refused, and if they are received, they shall be reported to the state board of horticulture.

Rule 7—It shall be the duty of every owner or possessor of any trees, shrubs or vines found to be infested with any injurious insects or infected with fungus or other diseases, to disinfect the same by cutting out and burning all infested branches, and if the whole tree is badly infected, the whole tree shall be cut out and burned.

Rule 8—All trees, shrubs or vines found to be infested with any injurious insects or infected with fungus or other diseases, shall be reported to the state board of horticulture, and if not so reported, they shall be reported to the county horticultural inspector.

Rule 9—Any and all fruit trees, whether in orchard or nursery, within the state found to be infested with any injurious insects or infected with fungus or other diseases, shall be reported to the state board of horticulture, and if not so reported, they shall be reported to the county horticultural inspector.

Rule 10—It shall be the duty of every owner or possessor of any orchard found to be infested with any injurious insects or infected with fungus or other diseases, to disinfect the same by cutting out and burning all infested branches, and if the whole tree is badly infected, the whole tree shall be cut out and burned.

Rule 11—It shall be the duty of every owner or possessor of any orchard found to be infested with any injurious insects or infected with fungus or other diseases, to disinfect the same by cutting out and burning all infested branches, and if the whole tree is badly infected, the whole tree shall be cut out and burned.

Rule 12—Disinfection as provided by these regulations shall be to the satisfaction of the county horticultural inspector, and if not so satisfied, he shall report the same to the state board of horticulture.

Rule 13—To make effective the horticultural law of the state, and the regulations of the board of horticulture, the county horticultural inspectors shall have jurisdiction, either by mail or telephone, to give this officer authority to make any necessary inspection, as required in rules 5 and 6, and shall hold the stock on premises until such inspection is made. Provided, that no shipment of nursery stock shall be held longer than 24 hours after notice of its arrival has been sent to the county horticultural inspector.

"HAMLET NOT INSANE."

So Decided by Debate of the English Classes at L. D. S. University

A very interesting debate was held yesterday afternoon at the Latter-day Saints' university. The question, "Resolved, That Hamlet was not insane," was considered by two sections of the second-year classes in English. A large number of students attended the proceedings, and the debate showed careful preparation on the part of the speakers. The debaters were E. H. Welling, Nora Noall, and Bert Reeve for the affirmative, and Burton W. Musser, Sarah Taylor and Stella Angell for the negative. Each side made a clever presentation, supporting the arguments with quotations from the play, and with the opinions of authorities on insanity and commentators on the text. In brief, the arguments were as follows:

AFFIRMATIVE.

That Hamlet's actions were those of an insane person; but that this was his purpose.

That feigning insanity was the only thing that could accomplish his purpose, which was to avenge the death of his father.

That he acted insane only in the presence of those he wished to deceive, and that his conduct was otherwise better than that of his friends.

That Shakespeare would not have made of Hamlet a dramatic hero irresponsible for his actions.

NEGATIVE.

That there are many degrees of insanity, and that Hamlet's peculiar bent of mind was one.

That Hamlet had sufficient cause for insanity, in his domestic affairs.

That, while he was at times perfectly rational, still at other times he was unquestionably irrational.

That feigning madness was not the best way to accomplish his purpose, which is evident from its failure.

The judges, Prof. Paul H. Evans and Birner, decided in favor of the affirmative. The basis of judging was: Substance and argument, 50 per cent; delivery, 25 per cent, and composition, 25 per cent.

SIMPLE FUNERAL RITES.

Remains of Mrs. T. M. Schomacher Laid to Rest by Loving Hands.

Very simple services were held yesterday by Rector Wilkins of St. Paul's Pro-Cathedral over the remains of Mrs. T. M. Schomacher, who died on Thursday at the Pacific Hospital after a prolonged illness, says the Los Angeles Express of April 22. At Rosedale cemetery previous to the cremation short services were held. Mr. T. M. Schomacher, the bereaved husband, will take the ashes to Mrs. Schomacher's home at Palmesville, O., for interment.

Mrs. Schomacher was widely known in this city, having spent the winter here two seasons past. Mr. Schomacher, who is traffic manager of the Great Short Line, is frequently in the city and has a wide circle of friends to sympathize with him in his bereavement.

Mrs. Schomacher was the daughter of the late Colonel Allen of Columbus, O. Her mother was of the old Huntington family of Connecticut. Gov. Huntington, the third executive of Ohio, was her grandfather, and a great uncle served with Washington in the Revolution, his honorable discharge, bearing Washington's signature, being treasured as a family relic.

Mrs. Schomacher was a woman who had traveled widely and possessed a highly cultured mind, of aristocratic impulses. During her visits to Europe, Polynesia and Asia she gathered material for her literary work, which her friends would have liked to have seen published, but she would only use her gifts now for the entertainment of those who liked to hear her.

Mrs. Schomacher was married in April 1892. There are no children to mourn her passing.

The ashes of the deceased were interred on Wednesday, April 26, at Palmesville, Ohio, as indicated above.
