DENVER OIL EXCHANGE.

Soon to Begin Operations - Some of the Rules Concerning Stocks.

From Denver comes the word that the new oil exchange to open there will soon be in active operation. Some of the rules concerning the listing of stocks are herewith given, the Denver News being authority for the follow-

Stringent rules for the protection of Investors are to be enforced by the Western Oil association which within the next week will have an exchange for the handling of oil stocks operating in the city. A meeting of the directors of the association was held yesterday at the Centennial club. It was decid-ed that stocks should be listed in two classes to comprise the producers and ron-producers, the latter to be known as prospects and to include all proper-

ties which are not producing enough oil to pay expenses. Searching inquiry is to be made by the listing committee into the equipment owned by each company, the amount of development done; whether their land is owned in fee or is leased, and on what terms. Every safeguard will be adopted to protect investors in oil stocks.

The most commendable part of the rules regarding prospects, however, is that the stock books of each company will be required to be deposited with some company and the stock registered. All of the common stock in the company will be pooled and the sale of only the treasury stock permitted on the exchange. In this manner investors in oil stocks will be absolutely assured that any money invested by them in stock of prospects will go into the de-

velopment work in the property and will not be pocketed by promoters. Rigid investigation will be prosecuted by the directors and the listing com-

nittee to see that this is the case. The holders of common stock will not be required to surrender this into the pool but as no stock can be transferred except by the trust company the purposes of a pool will be equally served. After a stock gets beyond the prospect stage then no restriction is placed on its sale, and any and all of the amount issued by the company

can be traded in on the floor of the ex-change. By confining the trading in prospect stocks to treasury stock only the association believes safeguards will be provided for investors which will
