

COUNCIL TO ACT AGAINST BREWERS

Where Law Is Being Violated a Showing Must Be Made.

FERNSTROM STARTS ACTION

He Secures Adoption of Resolution to Compel Appearance Before Committee—Ordinance Submitted.

According to the program announced, Councilman Fernstrom last night attacked the administration and the Republican party for being in league with the brewery owners of the city to increase the liquor evil in the city.

The speaker submitted a list of saloons owned and operated by the breweries of the city which made a most astounding showing. He asserted that the tax records of the county show that 57 of the 127 saloons in Salt Lake City are owned by the breweries.

Mr. Fernstrom said the figures showed Wagner's brewery to be in the lead with 25 saloons to its credit, the Salt Lake Brewing company, Jacob Moritz, principal owner, controlling 21, and Fisher's brewery coming third with 15.

by moving that the applications for renewals of liquor licenses be referred to the license committee to be checked off by the list, and that the city recorder be instructed to notify the breweries to meet with the license committee Thursday afternoon and designate three applicants they wish granted a license to the city ordinance. The motion carried unanimously.

INTRODUCES ORDINANCE. Mr. Fernstrom then introduced an ordinance, which had been prepared in his office, the city attorney, amending the present ordinance in relation to the issuance of liquor licenses, requiring any applicant for a liquor license to make affidavit that he is the owner of the premises to be used in his saloon and that the lease of the premises is in his name, even if the applicant does not own the building.

TREASURER'S REPORT. The city treasurer submitted a report, showing a balance on hand Oct. 1 of \$219,252.29. The receipts for September were \$2,445.86; the disbursements \$37,765.89. Of the total on hand, \$104,118 is in cash on deposit at the National Bank of the Republic.

THE MATTER OF EXCHANGE PLACE. The paving of Exchange Place, at the request of Samuel Newhouse, was granted. F. L. Hansen's claim for \$10 for stenographer's service and typewriter rent was referred to the sanitary committee. Payrolls aggregating \$15,509.37 were approved by the council.

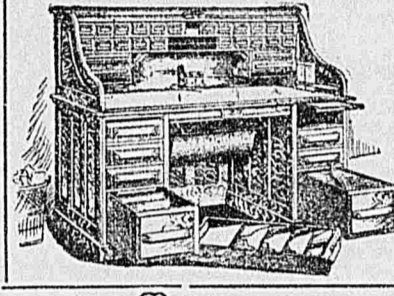

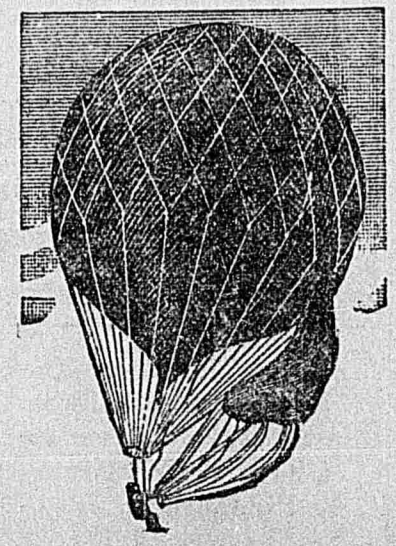
