THE UNION SIDE.

A few days ago, when he felt himself firmly entrenched, he made the offer to a prominent executive in the A. P. Attian made this offer before he was appointed Attias organizer by the Western Federation of Miners, consequently the hysterical protest on the part of Secy. A. W.
