Utah Greeks.

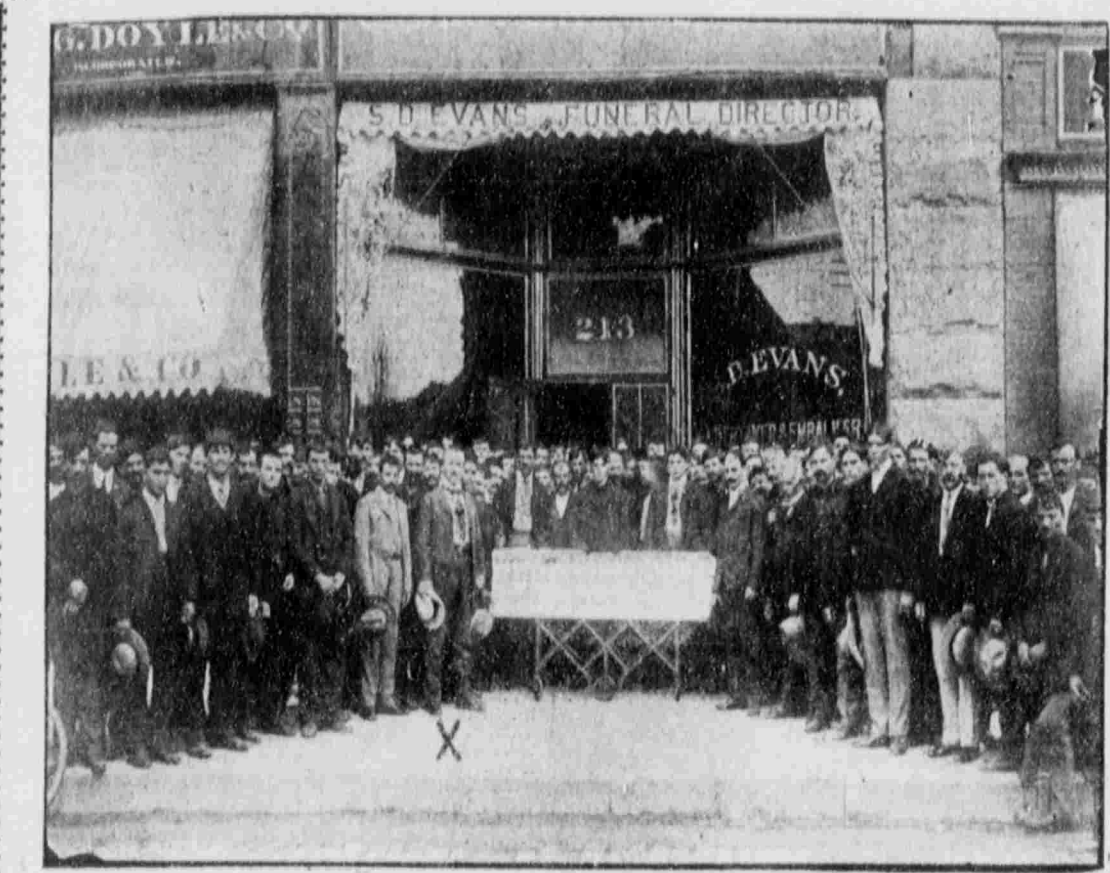
MAY BRING ON PROCEEDINGS.

Threats to Take Case of Alleged Il-
legal Practice of Medicine into
The Courts.

The case of Greek vs Greek seems to
have reached an acute stage and there
are now threats on against the would-
be leader of the Athenians to institute
proceedings for practicing medicine
without diploma or certificate. The
Skiris faction claims that Dr. Attas,
Hamilton, Dr. Smith, an English uni-
versity professor of Greek, the heir to
vast estates in Europe, or whatever he
styles himself today, has been treating
some score of Greeks for various ailments,
and during this process has been
accepting fees like a full-fledged doctor.

This morning affidavits were sworn to
by Greeks who had been "attended"
by the alleged doctor. One Greek swore
that he had paid Attas the sum of \$30.

SAY HE IS A FAKIR.
The old-time resident Greeks here
affirm that "Doctor" Attas is a fakir
pure and simple, and in substantiation
tell the following story, which begins

after Attas' meteoric career in Boston,
Toronto, Rochester, N. Y., St. Louis,
just prior to his hasty exit from Den-
ver.

"Doctor" Attas left by freight,
and was subsequently compelled to walk
part of the way, and by the time he ar-
rived at Cisco, Utah, he was in a pitia-
ble condition. Some sheepherders and
ranch men in that section found him
and took him to Cisco. He told them
he was a doctor, and a specialist in
women's diseases, and that he did not
have money to go any farther. The
people at Cisco took pity on him and
passed around the hat. The result was
that when he had a measure good over
the effects of crossing the Green River
desert in June he came on to Salt Lake
as a passenger, his baggage having
previously been expressed to Salt Lake
C. O. D. prior to leaving Denver. Up-
on his arrival here he hunted up Skiris,
who is the recognized leader of the
Greeks, and begged him to get his bag-
gage out of the express office, so that
he could have decent clothes to wear.
This was done, and Attas engaged a
room at the Wilson, where the same
evening his baggage was attached by
the Lake collecting agency for an al-
leged claim which a man by the name
of Hinchey claimed he had against him
for a hotel bill in Colorado. Then it
was, so claims Skiris, that he went to
Attas and presented a paper to him,
stating that it was a bond for his ap-
pearance at the justice's court in Mur-

from Skiris.

arrayed against any attempts to organ-
ize their fellow countrymen into a union
and to break the hold that Skiris has
over his following.
"Doctor" Attas, however, is decid-
edly handicapped, not only on account
of his past record and the warnings
that are issuing from the Greek press
to beware of him, but because he is a
