It Seethed, Spattered and Splashed with Conciliatory Wrath.

### TALK OF WHITEWASHING STATION.

Street Railroad Companies' Franchises  
Referred to the City Attorney.—  
The Curfew Ordinance.

The City Council held an adjourned session last night. The members in attendance were: Rich, Horn, Karrick, Hardy, Holt, Evans, Wimland, Heile, Lawson, Simondi, Moran. Beardley was chosen chairman and business was transacted as follows:

#### THE PROGRESSIVE.

THE CITY WHITEWASHING COMMENCEMENT.

Moran moved a reconsideration of the vote adjoining the resolution presented by the special committee appointed to investigate the charges recently presented against Fire Chief Austin concerning the committee's powers.

Hardy sprung the point that the motion was out of order not being under the head of the course of business decided upon.

The chair after some parliamentary sparing ruled that the motion was in order and it carried on the following vote:

Ayes—Rich, Evans, Heile, Horn, Leutzbach, Moran, Simondi, Wimland—8.

The resolution as published in these columns on Wednesday evening last was then read.

Lawson—in connection with this resolution—asked like to present his views (drawing a package of documents from his pocket).

Evans—lets I consent to such action I must know what they contain.

Horn—I would like to know what those papers contain in detail.

Lawson—I can only reply that I knew their contents in a general way.

Horn—I am satisfied, that they are more or less anonymous, but I am anxious to have the contents of the gentlemen who was then read.

Karrick—I had not intended to get on my feet tonight to speak but when I saw some of you are disposed to do so I thought I would. I am going to measure arms with you.

Moran—Well, I am going to see this thing knocked out if possible. It may contain charges against myself or the mayor for all I know.

Lawson—I will let you, gentlemen, if you will listen, to the reading of these papers you shall have the privilege of seeing them in print.

Horn—We don't doubt it at all.

Rich—I am in fact in favor of having the papers printed. I am informed that there is a direct bearing on the subject at issue.

The chair here ruled Lawson's motion out of order.

Rich—Do these papers contain charges in addition to those made by Mayor?

Lawson—Yes, sir.

Horn—Then I shall certainly object to them. I am very much opposed to giving the public any information of this kind.

Simondi—Yes, if the chief stone water melon when he was a boy you want to publish him for it.

Hardy—in such cases as this course would willingly and legitimately adopt. Why, sir, I am sure every body does the same thing. I see no harm in covering this scandal up but to investigate it to the bottom.

Lawson—There are twelve Liberal members in this council and I am bound to say that in their two houses is an everlasting shame and disgrace.

The papers were tabled on the following vote:

Ayes—Rich, Evans, Heile, Horn, Leutzbach, Moran, Simondi, Wimland—8.

The resolution was then defeated, the complexion of the vote being precisely the same as the two previous votes.

Moran then delivered a political harangue which figuratively speaking was as long as the Wasatch range, in support of which he had the name to discharge the special committee.

Hardy—Again, I say I am opposed to this committee which has given us a smalling tour in quest of additional charges.

Rich (warmly)—I do not think it is all because for Mr. Horn in speak of going on a smelling tour. I am a member of the special committee but (ironically) I am not a member of a smelling committee which practices such a tour. Last summer I was down in San Jose where I saw the Wasatch range some months ago and made the laughing stock of the community. (Laughter.) If you intend to cover up and kidnap here, I will tell you that the matter is not a small one (the grand jury) will be in a manner that will reflect no credit upon you. You are trying to find ones of your own officers who is

gaily of serious wrongdoing, but I will not be a party to the scheme, black my word, I will see this matter through.

Moran, Bell and Horn were all desirous of having the matter reported upon next Tuesday night and asked if the estimates could not be made.

Hardy—The reason of that committee (Kelly) is not here and I cannot speak for him, but this much I will say that the ordinance he never called his committee together a single time to consider the question of same. I am ignorant of the fact, but I am not informed by the same gentleman in his chairmanship over other committees, strictly speaking we have had no proceeding at all.

What is the reason there is Kelly tonight? was the mocking interrogative reply which escaped in the lips of many a comical listener.

The motion requesting the committee to report on Tuesday night was not seconded.

THE DECREE CHANGES.

The committee made improvements in the resolution recommending that the railroads be required to hold their meetings in the month in which to hold its meetings, providing it would pay for lighting and heating. Adopted.

#### TERESA CUTTA AND HUGH WORKER.

The communication of H. M. Hadley and E. J. Trumick, who recently signed off in their intention to build temples and virtuous little works in this city, was referred to the special executive committee.

The earlier ordinance of ancient fame was noted by the committee members and the date set for the first meeting was fixed which escape in the lips of many a comical listener.

Moran moved to strike out the existing clause, saying that Bevier and Ogden were the only towns in the United States where the entire law was in force, and that there was no room for discrimination from our cities. The city in which we lived was about fourth in size on this continent (laughing).

Moran's motion was then put and passed.

THE PART OF THE PENALTY IS FORTY TO IMPROVEMENTS.

An ordinance reducing the rate of annual license of employment agents from \$100 to \$50 per year was passed.

#### FRANCHISES REFERRED.

On motion of Wimland the application of the franchise to the street railway companies was referred to the city attorney with instructions to examine them carefully and report upon them at the next meeting of the Council.

#### KELLY'S CONCERN.

The following resolution, recently introduced by Kelly, was read and referred to the committee on ways and means:

Resolved, That whenever any party or parties desire or ask the City Council to grant franchises, that the amount of money to be paid for the franchise and party or parties shall deposit with the city recorder the sum of \$250 or prove sufficient to pay the expenses of the franchise to put it in operation, and the amount to be covered into the city treasury upon passage of franchises.

The franchise on "our winter residence" was puzzling to the committee and as Kelly was not present to explain their significance they are still shrouded in mystery.

#### GAS AND ELECTRIC LIGHT FRANCHISE.

The committee on streets reported follows in the matter of the franchise and extension of franchises in the city. Lake & Ogden Gas & Electric Light company:

We believe it would be in the advantage of both the gas company and the city if this extension of franchises is granted, subject to assessments when made. We believe it would be more difficult for this committee to agree upon any complete report concerning this resolution, we recommend that this resolution be referred to the committee on franchises to be considered as an adjourned meeting.

Referred to the city manager after which the Council adjourned.
