The inspiration of the Holy Ghost was plentifully poured out upon the speakers, and a deep and visible impression made upon the congregation.

UTAH STAKE CONFERENCE.

The Quarterly Conference of Utah Stake was held in Provo Meeting-house, Nov. 27 and 28, 1880.

After the usual devotional exercises,

President David John addressed the congregation on the necessity of the Saints being in earnest in carrying out the purposes of the gospel, and dwelt upon the predictions of Daniel relating to the establishment of the work of the latter-days.

Bishop Wm. Paxman followed, commenting on the peace, joy and happiness that surrounded the people of God in all ages when living in obedience to His laws and counsels delivered through prophets and inspired men; exhorted all to a continued faithful discharge of the duties of the gospel, that the immediate promised blessings might be enjoyed by them.

The afternoon of Saturday was occupied by the presentation of the business of the conference, followed with remarks by Prest. A. O. Smoot, exhorting the people to a punctual and prompt discharge of the current demands of the gospel upon them, urging parents to instruct their sons and daughters in the requirements of the gospel, including the law of tithing, advising that the payments made by the youth while laboring in connection with their parents be recorded in the name of the youth, that the inspiration and power of the record thus made might have direct effect upon the children, and bear evidence of their living faith; warned the people of existing evils, and, in strong terms denounced the recreant and faithless among the people.

Elder Wm. H. Bromley, of Springfield, under appointment for missionary duty in New Zealand, made brief remarks, bore a strong testimony to the truth of the work, soliciting the prayers of the Saints for his support in the duties of his mission.

Sunday, 10 a. m.

Apostle John H. Smith and Prest. Jos. F. Smith occupied the morning in instructive and interesting addresses, listened to with great attention by the congregation.

They were followed by President A. O. Smoot, who announced his departure by afternoon train on a visit to his relatives in the eastern States and would probably be absent for two months, as he intended preaching the gospel to his kinsfolk and searching the records for the genealogy of those who were dead; asked an interest in the prayers of the Saints that he might be successful on his mission.

In the afternoon Elders Andrew Ferguson and Wm. Robinson, of Spanish Fork, returned missionaries, addressed the congregation, after which Apostle John Henry Smith and Prest. Joseph F. Smith again addressed the Saints.

Conference adjourned until February 26th, 1881.

The choir contributed to the enjoyment of the occasion by the rendition of several fine anthems, and the frequent comment was made by the Saints that it was the best of conferences.

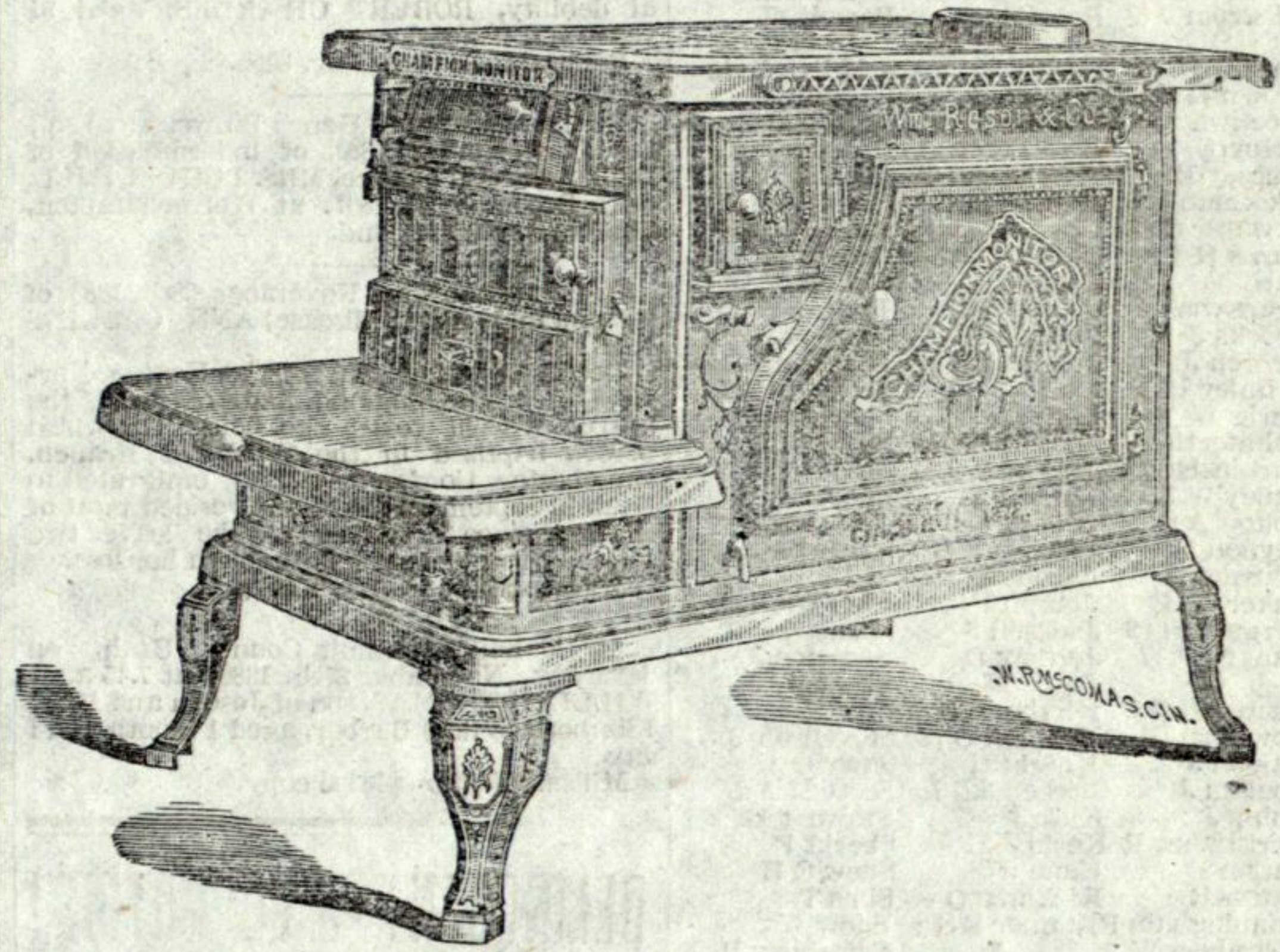
