FOREIGN.

LONDON, 20.—The Vienna correspondent of the *Times* says Russia desires that the understanding arrived at in the preliminary conference should be embodied in an identical note to be presented by each ambassador to the Porte, and that the Porte should be invited to negotiate on the points mentioned in the note. The object of this proceeding is to make Turkey, if she is obstinate, place herself in opposition to the will of United Europe. The course proposed will probably be adopted with some modifications. It is quite surprising how the preliminary conference has reconciled conflicting opinions. There is no longer any question affirming tributary States, but this is the only one of the reforms which are limited to administrative autonomy. Even in this respect the extreme views which once prevailed had gradually moderated. The impracticability of the general disarmament of the Mahometans has been recognized, and a prohibition against the wearing of arms in public substituted. The proposition to hand the administration entirely over to the natives of the various districts has also been considerably modified. There seems every probability not only of an agreement in the conference among the Europeans, but that the Turks may be even brought to acquiesce in the reform scheme, with slight modifications. It is thought that the question of guarantees must have been only touched upon in a very general way at the preliminary conference, so as not to become an obstacle, there having been, throughout, the most remarkable and growing disposition on all sides to avoid, as much as possible, everything which might cause a difference.

The steamer *City of Bristol*, which left Liverpool Dec. 6th for Philadelphia, has put back to Queenstown. She lost her foremast, and bowsprit and all attached, during a northwest gale on the 14th inst. The second officer and four seamen were washed overboard and drowned.
