HUST PAY CASH HEREAFTER.

Bakers Decide To Take Their Pay No Longer Than This Week.

A number of Salt Lake bakers got together today and decided that they would abolish a custom of being standers in the community. It is that of receiving two or three weeks.

The change is to take place on Monday next. It has been under consideration for more than a year past but it was not until this afternoon that negotiations were actually closed. The principal reason for the change is the number of old bakers.

It is to the vast majority getting in a large amount of flour at very low prices. They have worked a dead weight in their business. Besides they claim that the custom of being standers is a bad business, being improper, perhaps, when there was a great scarcity of money among the people, but now only valuable as a reminder of the days gone by.

Those who first submitted to the bakers were the Desert Baker Management, Chamber, Harmonies, Mrs. and Mr. F. Hall. The result is that when summer ends Journeymen may enter their erstwhile work, will be put in a place in the bucket instead of flour at themselves.
