THE BOGUS LORD BARRINGTON, HIS LATEST WIFE AND THE M'CANN MURDER MYSTERY.

Lord Frederick Seymour Barrington, in custody in St. Louis charged with the murder of a horse owner, James McCann, whose body was found in a quarry near St. Louis, is thoroughly bogus so far as his title is concerned. He is known to have been married to three women, to each of whom he represented that he was a Britisher of title with vast estates. The latest of his victims is Miss Wilhelmina Cochrane of Kansas City, whom he married some months ago. Some years ago Barrington served a term of nine years in England for embezzlement and only recently "did" six months in the St. Louis workhouse for assault. He was the last man seen with McCann before the latter's disappearance. Barrington was arrested, but was discharged when no proof of McCann's whereabouts was forthcoming. When, however, his body was found some days afterward Barrington was rearrested. He declares that he left McCann after the latter had had an altorcation with two strangers.

There were in reality two storms, but they blended into one. The Bronx was the first to feel its effects and the lowportion of that borough suffered st. These two divisions met over the lower Bronx with dazzling dis-plays of electricity. The first wind-torm was followed by a heavy fail of rain like a cloudburst in character and

a shower of large hallstones. Fanny Kinsler, a six-year-old child, frightened by the storm and blinded by the rain, ran directly under a wiftly-moving wagon and was killed instantly

POSTAL DEFICIENCY.

For Fiscal Year Just Closed Amounted to \$4,617,203,

Washington, July 2 .- Capt, Castle, the ditor of the treasury of the post-ice department, today made the ofcial estimate that the postal deficiency of the fiscal year just closed will be 4,617,203. The deficit for the previous local year was \$2,961,170. This big inrcase is attributed to the enormo rease in expenditure for the rural free elivery service during the past year. GERMS OF TITANUS.

Newark, N. J. Bacteriologist Discovers Them in Blank Cartridges.

New York, July 3 .- The bacteriologist of the Newark, N. J., board of health, has announced the discovery of tetanus germs in blank cartridges.

Heretofore it was generally believed that the many cases of lockjaw follow-ing Fourth of July accidents was due to dirt on the hands of the victims at the time they received their wounds. It was not suspected that fatal germs were in the cartridges. Several differ-ent makes were used in the tests. Ef. forts will be made to check the sales of blank cartridges today and tomorrow in the hope of lessening the usual number of deaths among children from
