# PLANS BIG HOTEL FOR ALL WORKERS

Colonel Miles of Salvation Army **Announces Project of Great** Importance.

### SUCCESS MET ELSEWHERE.

In the Last Five Years the Organization Has Invested Two Million Dollars in Similar Enterprises.

A building to cost in the neighborhood of \$20,000 on a site in the downtown district yet to be selected, will probably follow the visit to this city today of Col. Miles of the Salvation Army. Simflar plans have been carried to success in other western cities and Col. Miles assured the "News" in an interview this morning that such is his plan and that he will leave no stone unturned until he accomplishes his object. The plan of the buildings in other cities will be closely followed here. These buildings afford permanent headquarters for Salvation Army work. The Salvation Army store will be located in it. there will be a hotel for men with all modern equipment: a separate hotel for women, entirely modern and af-fording parlors, club rooms, reading rooms, music rooms, an excellent cafe and all other features to make the place inviting to girls without homes. This hotel, as planned, will cater especially to shop and factory girls, to store clerks and to girls and women employed as stenographers and in other commercial pursuits. Under the watchful eye of matrons the young women will be given every opportunity to meet their friends of both sexes at the hotel, to entertain them and be free from every condi-tion which might be for their detriment in other surroundings. The rental of quarters to the women will be regulated so that poorly paid shop and factory girls will be given comfortable and in-viting quarters at a most moderate all modern equipment; a separate hotel iting quarters at a most moderate cost.

#### · FOR ALL CLASSES.

For the men the hotel will cater to workingmen of all classes, whether in the ranks of the day laborer or the of-floeman or merchant. In nowise will the hotel be designed as the refuge for the results of the day the poverty stricken and the vagrant to the exclusion of the more fortunate classes, but will afford to all a comfortable home where no guest might feel ill at ease to take his friends for the enjoyment of a social hour. Club features, reading rooms, amusement halls and an excellent cafe will be features of the projected hotel. Colonel Miles said this morning that
