At Lewiston, Cache County, of inflammation of the lungs, BERTIE, youngest son of Arleh H. and Andere G. Brower, born May 25, 1878.

Deceased was born in County Antrim, Ireland, July 23, 1810. First heard the gospel in an early day and embraced it while a resident of the Isle of Man. He emigrated to Nauvoo in 1841, and suffered the trials and persecutions which the faithful Saints were then subjected to. Came to Utah with the second company of Saints, and was the third settler west of Jordan. Honored and respected by all who knew him. He leaves a large family to mourn his loss. He always testified to the truth of the cause which he espoused. He passed away without a pain or a struggle, and with the glorious hope of coming forth in the morning of the first resurrection.

In Virgen City, Kané County, Utah Territory, February 17th, 1880, of paralysis and dropsy, Sister HANNAH WALTERS WRIGHT, daughter of Walter and Sarah Walters, born April 16th, 1842, in Llanelly, Camarthanshire, South Wales. Emigrated to America in 1854; married to Brother Alexander Wright on March 19th, 1857. She was a faithful Saint, lived a life of usefulness, ever willing and ready to do good for the sick and distressed. She leaves a family of six children, with numerous friends.

In Farmington, Davis Co., Utah, on Feb. 10, 1880, aged 76 years, ISABELLA CAIN COWLEY. Deceased was formerly of the Isle of Man. she embraced the principles of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in the year 1840, emigrated to Nauvoo in 1844, and gathered with the Saints to the valleys of the mountains in 1852. She lived and died a Saint.
