Dirty and bedraggled, their bodies benumbed by the constant use of poisonous drugs and whiskey, standing on the sidewalk, they pleaded guilty to the charges against them.

The Morton woman was found by the police in a hotel, Plum Alley where she was connected with Chinamen. She is not only a morphine fiend but is addicted to the use of opium. She was unable to stand on the session of court and after being led back to jail sent word to have a plea of guilty entered for her. As an act of mercy more than anything else, Judge Bowman sentenced her to a term of 90 days in the city jail. There she will be unable to get morphine and opium and there is a chance, a bare chance, she will be cured of the habit.

The Schoppe woman has been in court many times before, charged with vagrancy, drunkenness and other offenses. She has been arrested on a charge she has been cautioned and twice imprisoned for her condition on the spectacle show presents. When Judge Bowman sentenced her to 90 days in the city jail, she flounced in her seat and remarked, "You can keep me here all winter for all I care."

LIBRARY GYM OFFICERS.

Members of Utah Commission Meet and Perfect Their Organization.

The members of the Utah Library-Gymnasium commission met yesterday afternoon in the office of A. C. Nelson, state superintendent of schools, and elected a permanent organization for the year. The following officers were elected: Prof. W. H. Henson, president; Dr. J. C. Thomas, of the Agricultural college, vice president; and Edward Briggs, of the University, secretary.

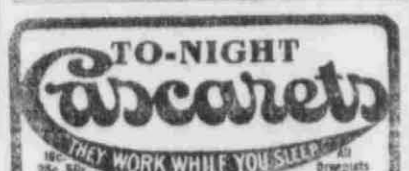
