

Sensational Newspapers.

Throughout the State, and, I believe, throughout the country, there is a demand for sensational news, and it is difficult to find a newspaper which can supply it. The religious newspapers especially bear down on the public mind, and the pulpit and irresponsible publications of journalism are also strong and belligerent in their character. Of prominent citizens, without a scintilla of evidence against them, worth one cent in the world's estimation, the *Pacific Charwoman* expresses our view exactly in these caustic words:

"The temptation to lie, in order to produce a paying sensation, is one of the vices of the popular newspapers. The religious publications, officers of state and church misrepresented and foully slandered, for no other purpose than to make papers sell. The fault, however, is not in the papers, or in those who conduct them. Those who purchase and read them become their endorsers and patrons, and their general circulation shows that there is a demand for low news, and also for scandalous publications which have no regard for truth or virtue. Young and old must be guarded from the demoralizing effects of a mere sensationalism. This city, like others in the land, is cursed with the evil to which we refer. An instance of gross wrong done to one of our own citizens has recently occurred. To be sure, it was not published afterward, but all who saw and read the first attack will not see the correction. Would that all good citizens—that all ladies, at any rate—would discourage instead of encourage such publications to which we have referred."
