Open Again.—The blockade on the Utah Southern is raised. The regular trains went down the road yesterday, and half of Provo came up in the evening to celebrate the event.

Nice Beef.—It has been rumored in town that there was no good beef to be had, but in passing Jas. Williamson's family meat market, whose advertisement appears in our columns, it will be seen that he, at least, has some very nice, choice, fat beef.

Temporary Home.—The labors of Dr. McKenney, the temperance lecturer, in the proposed institution of a "Temporary Home," for the support and reformation of inmates. The upper floor of the Emporium Building, nine rooms, is to be rented for the purpose. Nearly \$300 has been subscribed for the purpose.

Obsequies.—The funeral services over the remains of the late Mrs. Maria Colebrook, were held this forenoon, in the 14th Ward Assembly Rooms. There was a large attendance of the friends and acquaintance of the family, and the meeting was addressed, in turn, by Elder Edward Stevenson and President D. H. Wells.

Postponed.—The relatives of the late Brother George Hoggan, wish to apologize to the many friends of the deceased for the postponement of his funeral, appointed for last Sunday. The delay was caused by his eldest son, being detained by the snow blockade on the Utah Southern Railroad. They now announce that the funeral will take place to-morrow, (Wednesday) at 10 a.m., in the Eleventh Ward Meeting-house, and invite all friends to be present.

Beaver "Watchman" Notes.—Cattle dying on the range in large numbers.

Three soldiers deserted from Fort Carson, after drawing their four months' pay.

The officers and soldiers stationed at Ft. Cameron have contributed \$10 to the Irish Relief Fund.

Bishop Asworth has been appointed Mayor of Beaver City, to fill out the unexpired term of J. H. Skinner, deceased. It is a good selection.

The Blue Mountain mining district has been reorganized. It is about 15 miles west of Beaver, and at a meeting held, B. L. Croft was re-elected recorder. This district claims to have some of the most valuable iron mines in Southern Utah.

Perished in the Snow.—The Silver Reef Miner says: Three weeks ago a young man named David Bullock started out from Cedar City on horseback to go to what is known as Winter Ranch, a station some distance off kept by his brother. The snow was so deep that he was unable to go, and when he was about 20 miles from Cedar City he sent his horse back and attempted to finish his journey on snowshoes. That he was unable to do so, and it is supposed that the unfortunate young man lost his way and has perished in the snow.

Resolutions of Respect.—Following is the text of the resolutions adopted by the Legislative Assembly, in respect of the late Hon. A. P. Rockwood. They were presented yesterday in the House, by Hon. C. W. Penrose:

Resolved, That in the death of our esteemed friend and fellow laborer for the public good, we, the whole Territory of Utah, have sustained a severe loss. For he was a true, honest, trustworthy, patriotic, and devoted citizen, and his services to his country, and his industry and close scrutiny into every detail upon the public funds, he fairly earned the title of "The Watchman of the Treasury." He was also a pioneer fish culturist of Utah, and through his enterprise many varieties of the finny tribe were imported and newly introduced into the waters of this Territory. For upwards of 15 years he was a working Director of the Deseret Agricultural and Manufacturing Society, also Warden of the Utah Penitentiary, and during all his career was a patriotic, well-disposed and public-spirited citizen, widely known and generally respected.

That Ticket Office Window.—The Theatre ticket office window, so often referred to, was experienced afresh last evening. Ladies are pushed and hauled about, small boys half smothered, and sour tempers created at the rate of ten to the second, and all because another door of admittance, of which there are three in the front of the building, cannot be opened for the accommodation of those who have reserved their seats and bought tickets before-hand, and the office window reserved in its corner for the benefit of those who come to get their tickets at the "eleventh hour." The Theatre, it is true, is not always jammed as it was last night but the phenomenon of a crowded entrance and a half stifled multitude occurs there often enough to justify a complaint and protest against the circumstance.

The matter was to-day referred to the committee on counties, with Messrs. Francis and Penrose added to the committee.

Passed the House.—This morning the bill H. F. No. 1, "To remove the political disabilities of the women of Utah," which has lain upon the table so long, was taken up on motion of Hon. W. B. Preston, and read the second time by sections; on motion of Hon. John R. Murdock it was read the third time by its title, and on motion of Hon. A. McKinnon, passed. On motion of Mr. Grover, the yeas and nays were called, and stood—Yeas: Fisher, Francis, Gardner, Horta, Jacques, Johnson, Lyman, McKinnon, Murdock, Penrose, Peterson, Preston, Shaw, Thompson, and the Speaker. Nays: Dusenberry, Farr, Grover, Hatch, Pack, Peery, Sharp, and Smith. Then the question was decided affirmatively by a vote of 15 to 5 in the House, and the bill was then sent to the Council, where it was read the first time and laid upon the table, to come up in its order.

The New Council.—The newly elected members of the City Council will be installed in office to-night.
