The price of the machine was \$900, the balance being cost of transporting it to Eureka. The engine's capacity is \$0 gallons of chemicals and will weigh about 1.700 pounds. ## USE THE RIFLE ON DEER.

Shooting and Fishing Indorses That Suggestion.

In regard to the use of rifle or shot-gun in hunting deer, Shooting and Fishing says:

Long ago a majority of American sportsmen recognized the rifle as the true arm to use in hunting all game that wears fur. It is true that there are persons who hunt deer with the shot-gun that are good sportsmen in the best sense of the word, but we believe that if the opinion of all American sportsmen were asked as to the proper arm to use in deer hunting from a sportsman's point of view, it would be over-whelmingly in favor of the rifle,

There have been many reforms in sportsmen's ethics during the past few years. We have seen the number of game animals permitted to be killed regulated by law; the use of dogs in hunting deer has been largely abol-ished; the jacklight has been forbidden in many States, and the females and the fawns of game animals protected. The question is now raised: Shall laws be enacted prohibiting the use of the shotgun in deer hunting? An act to this effect is to be considered by the legislature of Pennsylvania.
