Special Correspondence Blackfoot, Ida., Aug. 12 .- The frost and cold spell which came unusually late this spring, caused our farmers and beet raisers considerable concern at that time, as it was feared that the fruit crops had been killed, and the beet and other crops injured. But in traveling around in the various settle ments now and looking over the excel-lent crops of corn, squash, beans and other tender plants one would not know that we had a backward spring. The orchards in most places in the Blackfoot clake are loaded with fine fruit and the sugar beets are surprising the beet farmers in their rapid growth. Many wheat fields will average from 50 to 60 turkels per acre, and some will go higher than that. The second crop of alfalta is very heavy, and almost ready to gather. The sugar factory at Blackfoot is rapidly nearing completion. Our greatest need is more good, industrious settlers to cultivate the thou-sands of acres of good, rich land which sands of acres of good, rich land which our limited population cannot handle to advantage. We are blessed with an abundant supply of water for irrigation purposes, and cold, clear and pure wa-ter for drinking and household use.
