**WOMEN IN THE FIELDS IN GER-
MANY.**

While riding into the country yester-
day, we saw large numbers of women
hard at work in a line, and seemed to
be planting seeds. They worked with
a small hoe, and were being led on by a
man who was ahead of them with a staff
in his hand. It must be tiresome to
the spine; now and then one would
stand erect to get rest, as they went
along; their hands touch the ground.
Everywhere the women do the hardest
of the work. We saw two pumping at
a huge pump to fill a sprinkling cart.
At other places they were carrying im-
mense loads of lime in a barrel strapped
on their back, and wherever you see a
new building being erected, you see
women making mortar and carrying the
brick and mortar up the scaffolding to
the very top of the works. We also saw
women working with men grading on
the railway. They shovel with the
long shovel, and help to fill up a cart
that is wheeled to the dump by both
men and women; through most all the
streets you see women with heavy loads
on their backs, either in baskets or a
sort of a tub made on purpose.—[Ex.

THE USES OF CHARCOAL.—Rubbing

smell by charcoal. When meat, fish,
etc., from intense heat or long keeping,
are likely to pass into a state of corrup-
tion, a simple and pure mode of keeping
them sound and healthful is by putting
a few pieces of charcoal, each the size of
an egg, into the pot or saucepan in
which the flesh or fish is to be boiled.
