MUNICIPAL MATTERS.

Halls Granted To the Legislature On a Resolution By O'Meara.

FINAL DISPOSITION OF SEWAGE.

Young Wasn't It Kept Out of the Jordan If Possible—Minor Matters Considered.

Last night's session of the City Council, though not long protracted one, was fraught with great results, and while the business transacted was not of any great moment, yet it was disposed of in a businesslike manner, and showed what Salt Lake's men can do when that spirit of quibbling which has become so characteristic, is not in evidence. An interested listener to the proceedings was Alderman M. C. Sullivan of Toledo, Ohio, upon whom no doubt, the mode of procedure last evening had a good effect. Consequently, John Allen, who turned the political tables in the Second precinct on election day, was present and got a good insight into the art of municipal management. The business as presented and disposed of is as follows:

PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS.

Frederick Lockett, at 231 east Third South, asked for an extension of water mains. The petition was accompanied by a recent map showing the Terciary Valley in the effect that it be granted. No orders upon recommendation of waterworks committee.

T. A. Johnson petitioned for the granting of a free license to Mr. O. H. Knobell.

J. W. Russell asked that the city grant him a title to certain land improved by him in section 7, township 1 south, range 2 east, for an equitable consideration. City attorney.

E. K. Nichols, member of the People's Foreign Legion, wanted a release against the proposition to dispose of the sewage by turning it into the Jordan river, claiming that it would entirely destroy some of the leading industries of the Territory, especially the salt works, and salt works outside of the Great Salt Lake. Mayor committee.

A communication was received from the board of education asking that sidewalks leading to the public schools be repaired. Street committee.

J. G. Irwin presented a claim of \$100 for services as deputy sheriff in serving summonses, etc. City attorney.

M. G. Midgley presented an itemized bill for services rendered as arbitrator of the Farrell estate. A motion to decline was made by Young, which was duly seconded and carried.

The Utah Title Insurance and Trust company presented a bill for \$100 for insurance on the city April 15, 1895. Committee on claims.

S. A. Woolley asked for release from tax of lots 21 and 22, block 7, plat B, Brigham Davis. She a similar petition, granted upon recommendation of city attorney.

Z. C. Mitchell asked for a deed to lot 2, block 2, plat D, in the city cemetery. Cemetery committee.

RECORDS OF CITY OFFICERS.

Upon the recommendation of Mayor Basin, Joseph E. Calfee and George M. Downey were sustained as members of the board of public works, their terms having expired.

The city recorder reported the publication of a notice of election on South Temple from between I and J to M streets. Approved.

Upon recommendation of the city attorney James T. Hall was given permission to readem lots 23 and 24, block 4, North Main street, subject to payment of tax, interest and costs.

At this juncture the Council's proceedings were interrupted by Councilman Cook asking for information regarding the petition of William Woolley, who had been granted a reduction of taxes. Mr. Woolley's petition had been reported upon adversely by the city attorney, and his report adopted, consequently the Council could do nothing.

The waterworks department submitted a bill for water and tax bills audited for month ending November 25, 1895. The total was \$3,588.35. Filed.

D. Garnet, city investment inspector, asked permission to hire mechanics for the purpose of repairing the immense number of horse teams used by the wholesale butchers, Granville.

Louis Biscoe presented a bill of \$60

for coal services rendered as justice in the city of Salt Lake. A suit was made and carried.

M. D. Rice, one of the arbitrators in the Farrell estate, submitted an itemized account of expenses, showing that he has worked fifty-four days. Referred to special committee having the right to audit.

The committee on municipal laws and streets recommended the passage of bill No. 173 for an ordinance regulating the number of street cars within the corporate limits of Salt Lake City. Passed.

The committee on waterworks reported adversely on the petition of M. H. Griswold asking an extension of water mains. Adopted.

The license committee reported favorably on the bill authorizing a new state liquor license, on account of retiring from business. Adopted.

Smith Heap was granted a license as merchandise pedler on account of want of age.

SOFT LIQUOR.

Liquor licenses were granted to H. K. Eggen, Hospital and Stans, Jonathan Rice, Oscar Youngberg, Jacob M. H. Remsey & Co., Riley & Ford, 107 south East Temple, and 107 First South, and Fernandes & Standard.

HALLS FOR THE LEGISLATURE.

The following resolution, offered by O'Meara was adopted unanimously:

Whereas, On or about the first week in January, 1896, will convene in the State House, Salt Lake City, the Legislature of the State of Utah, and

Whereas, As Salt Lake City will require a large amount of time for the preparation of the session of the Legislature, and the time required for the preparation of the House of Representatives, therefore,

Be it resolved, That we the City Council, will consider the use of the Council chamber for the session of the Legislature, and that the third floor be reserved for the use of the House of Representatives, use of chamber, and the floor above.

It is further resolved, That the arrangements for the preparation of the building be hurriedly completed, so being the matter at once before the full committee, have a committee confer with Governor Wells in regard to providing accommodations for the Legislature in this building for the session.

TRAIL TO DAVIS COUNTY.

Clarence Colby at this point gives a detailed verbal report on the visit made by the service committee to the county. He stated that while the county officials were very non-committal he believed they would report satisfactorily on the request of the city. Colby said that the county officials of Davis, asking that they permit the city of Salt Lake to construct an open ditch in which to convey the sewage to the Jordan, was denied and rejected.
