Arrive at Salt Lake City at 11 p.m.

Tickets must be procured at the Office of the Company, or at the Ticket Office, and will be charged if the fare is collected on the Train.

On and after August 1st the regular rates on Ore, Bullion, Coke, Charcoal and Coal will be \$2.15 per ton between Salt Lake City and Highway House in car lots of not less than 15,000 lbs. loaded and unloaded by the Company, and \$2.00 per ton when not loaded or unloaded by the Company.

Freight for the West will be received on week days only from 7 a.m. to 10 a.m. and forwarded the same day, while that received from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. will be forwarded the next day.
