Kennison, a union organizer sent to Michigan to look into the situation there. He reported that in the lead and copper districts skilled mechanics, carpenters, miners, and other wage earners were forced to work 10-hour night shifts and 11-hour day shifts for only \$1.40 per day in wages. He urged careful considera-tion of the Michigan situation with a view to its betterment.

### STRIKE PROPOSED.

A telegram was received from Brit-ish Columbia stating that a mass meeting would be held there tonight to consider calling a strike in the Nan-atimo coal mines. The company has or-dered a ten per cent reduction in wages effective June 1, and have announced a fee of 10 cents per day to be held out of wages for ferry boat service. The local union of carpenters sent in a request that Utahna park be de-clared unfair to union labor. A group picture of delegates has been arranged for, to be made on the steps of the city and county building.
