

## Our Country Contemporaries.

Ogden Junction, April 13—

Nineteen cars of emigrants went West last Saturday, and we are informed there are 17,000 between Ogden and Omaha, and 12,000 at the latter city waiting for cars to convey them towards the Pacific Coast. This western emigration is being over done.

Look out for complete destruction of our fruit unless we kill off the codling moths. The eggs just hatching into worms are in the rough bark on the trees and cedar posts in fences. Rasp off the rough bark from the fruit trees, and strip off the cedar bark from the posts and burn it. Everybody should attend to this, right now.

Last Saturday evening the danger of throwing rocks, indulged in by many of our boys, was painfully illustrated. Some boys were playing near the residence of Mr. John Reeve, when a large stone was thrown, in play, but it struck a son of Mr. Reeve, 14 years of age, in the face, breaking his nose and inflicting a wound over the eye. The injured boy is in a fair way of speedy recovery, but the danger of this practice might have received a fatal illustration, and this should be a warning to the juveniles.

Beaver Enterprise, April 9—

Granite District. Very flattering reports come to us from this district. George Reed exhibits from his mines some large and very rich looking specimens of ore. Rev. Smith, Judge Boreman and several officers of Fort Cameron are interested in the mines of this district, and it is said that Charles Woodhouse and others are making arrangements to put up a smelting furnace in connection with George Reed's mine. We wish them success in their enterprise.

The Elephant mine in Star District is reported to be improving in quantity of ore and grade; the owners are having large timbers procured from Pole canyon by contract with Damon & Co., for the purpose of timbering and putting the mine in firstclass condition for profitable working.

Lincoln district. This camp has become all the rage since the advent of Judge Spicer in it. The town of Lincoln has been laid off, the plat recorded, and the town now contains Spicer & Smith's smelter, Dupax's store, a saloon, and about twenty houses with over a dozen families. The County Court of Beaver Co., at its last session, organized this district into a civil precinct, by the appointment of Judge Wells Spicer as Justice of the Peace, H. Guyman as constable and Jehu Blackburn as road supervisor.

The furnace has been doing a splendid business, having made its runs without "freezing" or "chilling" from the beginning.

The Rollins mine, formerly known as the "old lead mine," under the working of Judge Spicer is turning out to be the number one mine of Utah, and is said to be improving daily in quantity of ore and grade as it approaches the depth of 200 feet.

Spicer is also working several other mines, among them the Ontario, which promises to be a very valuable property, having at present a very wide vein of galena and carbonates. The camp is in many respects promising, having by the mines plenty of wood and water, and will soon have a post office, telegraph and express office.
