## A Case of Quarantine Violation and Counter Complaint.

Homer Bills is not only guilty of vioating quarantine regulations in departing from his home at 114 south Eighth West street, but he has committed another serious breach of the laws in

mailing a letter to the board of health. The letter, by the way, is a scorcher. He heaps all kinds of opprobrium on that office, which he asserts has half starved him in his quarantined home, and threatens to break out if the board does not send him some food and coal. He complains that he and his wife and

He complains that he and his wife and infant child have been grossly neglect-ed by the city authorities. Bills has not starved to death, how-ever, Indeed, he must have been comfortably well off during his term of confinement, for the county board has sent him a good deal of food and coal during the last three weeks. Bills when working, drives a team and hauls hay for Holt Brothers. Whether he afford to live in luxury or not is not known.

The county board claims to be at tending to the succor of many cases that belong to the city. In five days week the board contributed \$80 to the city patients.
