In Mine and Mill.

Business at all mines is picking up considerably, and even at the very low prices at which silver now is, more men are in employment at mines and mills than since the year 1891, when everything was considered to be silver. No one much wants one to bring him in his mine, and the miners are in their mines of the best ore at the present price of silver, but a large amount of timber ore is being produced, and heavy development work is being done by all the mines.

A large number of men and thousand of logs are being used in the renewal of timber, and the same can be said of all the other mines.

With the close of the year the ore shipment will show up very large, and the mills and docks will be busy in new shipping on account of ore to be delivered next year; the valley miners are eager to secure the Park City ore.

The Ontario mill is undergoing repairs to its steam and furnace, by the removal of new fire brick. This is the usual yearly repair work at this mill.
