LOCAL BRIEFS.

The Veteran Firemen's association will meet this evening at their Canyon road hall, and all old firemen are invited to attend.

Phillips church was well attended last night, on the occasion of the special service, by the choir assisted by additional talent.

Sunday religious services have been resumed at the state prison, as the rioters have quieted down and are ready to "behave themselves."

E. J. and H. companies, Twenty-ninth infantry, are the only companies now at the post, with the band. The remainder of the garrison is in the Strawberry valley.

Synopsis of Interesting and Eloquent Discourse Delivered at the Tabernacle by Bishop Whitney.

The Holy Ghost and His mission among men, was the main theme treated at the Tabernacle yesterday afternoon by Bishop Orson F. Whitney. The meeting was presided over by President John R. Winder, and a feature of the service was a solo by Mrs. Lizzie Hughes Brundage, who sang most beautifully, "My Redeemer and My Lord."

The choir sang the hymn: How are Thy servants blest, O Lord, How sure is their defense.

Prayer was offered by Elder Sylvester Q. Cannon.

The choir further sang: O, my Father, Thou that dwellest, In the high and glorious place.

Bishop Whitney, the speaker, read from the eighth chapter of the Acts of the Apostles, beginning with the 15th verse. The passages cited refer to the bestowal of the Holy Ghost, and the attempt by Simon the Sorcerer to purchase this gift with money. Commenting on these verses the speaker said that there were some things that money could not buy. He was not antagonistic to men of wealth, for he believed that such men were gifted of God, and that money, honestly obtained, and rightly used, was a great blessing. But it was not the all-in-all that some people imagine. In this connection he read of a rich man who desired to purchase the great arch on the temple of Delphi, and the prophet said to him: "There are some things that money can not buy."

The speaker deprecated the distinction of money, and said that money was a false standard. True greatness did not consist in wealth, nor in office-holding. It was something infinitely greater. JULY 17th

1744—Elbridge Gerry, "signer" of the Declaration of Independence, died 1814.

1745—Timothy Pickens, statesman, born in Salem, Mass.; died 1829.

1746—Peter Gansevoort, soldier, born in Albany, died 1812. Gansevoort joined the Revolutionary forces as major of the Second New York soon after Lexington. His services were chiefly in central New York, where he fought against the Indians and British. One of his victories was the defense of Fort Mifflin, where he defeated St. Leger and prevented his cooperation with Burgoyne.

1750—Charlotte Corday was guillotined for killing Marat.

1858—End of the war in Cuba; General Toral, Spanish commander at Santiago and vicinity, surrendered the city.

1904—Russians under General Keller repulsed in an attempt to recapture Motien pass from the Japanese.
