

Made New Record for Huge Appropriations and Very Far-Reaching Legislation.

THE END CAME PEACEFULLY.

President at Capitol for an Hour-Vice President and Speaker Received Senate's and House's Thanks.

Washington, March 4 .- With a new record for large appropriations and farreaching legislation, the Fifty-ninth Congress was brought to a close shortly after noon today. The last few hours had been tame by comparison with what had been expected. Long before noon Senator Gallinger's fight for the passage of the ship subsidy bill had been abandoned and, the filibuster against it conducted by Senator Carmack being no longer necessary, he surrndered the floor, much to the disappointment of the galleries. Extreme fatigue, due to continued night sessions in the house during the last week, had a dampening effect upon many con-

gressmen, and the usual excessive "last day" enthusiast was confined to less than half the membership. President Roosevelt, with his cabi-

One of Greatest Fruit Producing Sections of State-Enormous Vield Of Onions and Potatoes.

One of Weber county's representatives in the Seventh state legislature is George S. Dean, who halls from the fruitful burg of North Ogden. Mr. Dean is a man of varied accomplishments. He was admitted to the bar to practise law in 1884, and has conducted a notary office in his home town continuously since that time. Besides this

he is a newspaperman, having established the first printing plant in North Ogden in 1890. It is still the only plant there. He has been secretary of the North Ogden Irrigation company continuously since 1588, and secretary of the Caldwater Creek company since 1892

1892. "North Ogden is one of the best irri-gated sections in the state," said Mr. Dean today, "having five well man-aged irrigation companies and lots of water. It is also one of the best sec-tions in the world for fruit growing, more than so cars of peaches having been sent out last year by two firms alone. It is no uncommon thing for North Ogden land to yield \$500 worth of Elberta peaches to the acre, con-sequently land is very valuable in that district. district.

SOME POTATOES, TOO. "About 20,000 baskets of first-class frapes were sold by one grower in 1905, and two carloads of onlons were shipped by one farmer. The yield of potatoes and onlons per acre is some-thing enormous, onlons going as high as 1,250 bushels and the potato crop be-tween 500 and 600 bushels per acre. "Tomatoes yield from 10 to 15 tons per acre, and sugar beels 22 tons to the acres. The North Ogden canning fac-tory shipped 30 cars of canned toma-tops last season. In 1906 North Ogden shipped to the Ogden sugar factory its carloads of beets, each car contain-ing from 80 to 40 tons.
