Gunnison, Sanpete Co., March 30 .-The drouth for the past three years is awakening the people everywhere to

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the need of learning the art of irriga-Gunnison is expending about eleven thousand dollars in labor and material in the improvement and enlargement of their reservoir. The dam has been raised seven feet, making it now twen-ty-nine feet deep. The outlet, hereto-fore in the center of the dam, was taken out in order to strengthen the dam, with a solid wall. A tunnel 286 feet in length, made through the rock, now taps the reservoir for the conveyance of the water to the canal; this tunnel is six by four feet and lined with cement. On account of the enlargement of the reservoir a large tract of land, adjacent has been purchased, which, together with the steel gate for the mouth of the tunnel, has made quite a heavy expenditure. It is intended to yet raise the dam three feet higher, which will entail graphite. Other minerals show how the steel has been treated. The mass is
