## TALMAGE AS A PROPHET.

## Editor Deseret News:

## DEATHS.

PETERSON.—At Spanish Fork, Utah County, May 11th, 1886, of pneumonia, Margaret, Matilda, beloved wife of Soren Peterson, aged 39 years and 1 month. Deceased leaves a husband and six children, the youngest being only six weeks old. She was an affectionate wife and loving mother.

WILLIS.—Joshua Thomas Willis, of kidney disease, on the first of May, 1886; he was the son of Merrill and Margaret Willis; born December 21, 1818, in Galiton County, Illinois; joined the Church in an early day; was driven out of Missouri in 1839, returned to Illinois and married Josiah Cherry in 1841; death deprived him of his wife and child in 1845. He then left his home and property and went to Nauvoo, from there to Winter Quarters on the Missouri River in 1846; in the spring of 1847, left Winter Quarters for Salt Lake Valley as captain in John Taylor's hundred; arrived in the fall of the same year; married Sarah M. Dodge in 1848, moved to Provo in the spring of 1849, was one of the first settlers of that place, and chosen first Counselor to Bishop Isaac Higbee, was also sheriff of Provo for several years.

He was called to Cedar, Iron County, in the fall of 1853 and lived there till 1858; moved to Toquerville; was one of the first settlers, was ordained Bishop November 18, 1861, by Apostle Orson Pratt. In 1870 he emigrated to Arizona; took a trip in Old Mexico in 1883. In the fall of the same year he went to Utah, visiting some of his children and friends; at the same time went to the St. George Temple with some of his family and did a good work; returned to Arizona on the 15th of March, 1886; was taken sick on the 19th of April; after suffering intensely for 12 days, went to rest, leaving wives and children and many grand-children to mourn his loss. He was a faithful laborer in the vineyard of the Lord, and the cause of Zion in this land.—[COM.]

ELLIS.—At his residence in the Third Ward, Logan, on Saturday, May 15th, 1886, James Ellis, aged 35 years. Deceased was born in Glamorganshire, South Wales, where he received the Gospel and labored as a traveling Elder for seven years previous to his emigration with his family to Utah in the year 1853. Brother Ellis was much interested in the Sunday School work, and was appointed the first superintendent in the ward in which he resided. He was among the early settlers of Logan, arriving here in 1860, and saving the first piece of lumber in that city. He died in full faith of the Gospel.

KING.—Edward James King, son of Edward King and Elizabeth Nicol, at 3 a. m., of heart disease and dropsy, after a lingering sickness of 10 months; was born March 18, 1835, at Millwall, London, England. Died in 16th Ward.

BLONQUIST.—In the Thirteenth Ward of this city, May 20th, 1886, from milk fever, Mrs. Matilda Blonquist, aged 43 years.

FUNK.—At her residence in Newton, Cache County Utah, May 12th, 1886, of cancer, Christina Svenson Funk, wife of Bishop Hans Funk; born July 10th, 1834, in Sweden; joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Copenhagen, Denmark, 1853; emigrated to Utah in 1853. She was the mother of seven children, six of whom await her in the spirit world. She was a true wife and a faithful Latter-day Saint. Scandinavian Star please copy.

BOSHARDT.—In Gunnison, Elizabeth Boshardt; she was born in Switzerland, December 17th, 1823; was baptized in 1854, and emigrated to Utah in 1857, crossing the plains with a hand-cart company. The date of death was not furnished.—Ed. D.N.]

JOHNSON.—In the 16th Ward of this city, May 28th, 1886, of pyramin, Neils Johnson, aged 49 years, 7 months and 18 days. The deceased was born October 10, 1837, in Lund, Sweden; was baptized in 1853; came to Utah in 1862, and has resided in Salt Lake City ever since. He was the builder of the organ in the Salt Lake Assembly Hall, and in 1884 remodeled the large Tabernacle organ.

WATKISS.—Lucy H. Watkiss, daughter of C. W. and Lucy Watkiss, in Salt Lake City, May 28, 1886, of paralysis of the heart, caused by diphtheria. She was a promising child of 7 years.

MARSDEN.—In the Fifth Ward of this city, May 30th, 1886, James Marsden. Deceased was born October 26th, 1827, at Brampton Moor, near Chesterfield, Derbyshire, England.

GREENALGH.—At his residence in Santaquin, Utah County, May 23d, 1886, of pneumonia, John Greenalgh; born June 9th, 1837, in Lancashire, England, emigrated to Nauvoo in 1841, was baptized in the Mississippi river in 1845, suffered with the Saints in their expulsion from Nauvoo, came to Utah in 1892, and in the general move south in 1893, went to Santaquin, where he resided until his death. He was a true and faithful Latter-day Saint.—COM.
