LOCAL BRIEFS.

State Engineer Chas. Tanner is in the Strawberry country from which he returns later in the week.

Miss Milvina Jensen of this city, has undergone an operation at the Eastern-Wright hospital for meningitis, following a severe case of typhoid fever. The patient is doing well.

Captain Bourne of a troop is working hard to bring up the personnel of his command to a high standard, and undesirable members have been dropped from the roster. "The strength of the troop is now over 40."

Today is payday for the teachers of the city schools and for the regular salaries for the second month of the school year are being distributed by Clerk Judd. The total amount of the payroll is \$27,944.44.

Ben Harris of this city has been chosen president of the vocal students' society at Ann Arbor. He is a graduate of the Salt Lake High school, and is a prominent member of the University football team.

There is a movement on foot to have an all-night service installed at the Salt Lake postoffice, when the transfer has been made from the Dooly block and the office is again in regular running order in the new Federal building.

W. S. Willis, a well known member of the typographical union, and former assistant editor of the Tribune, left last night, with Mrs. Willis, for Riverside, Cal., where they will remain. Mr. and Mrs. Willis came to Salt Lake in 1888.

The Salt Lake County Horticultural society will hold its regular meeting, on Saturday at 1 p. m. at the city and county building, third floor. Lectures will be delivered upon different topics pertaining to fruit industry. All fruit growers are invited.

The ladies of the W. C. T. U. will give a reception for Mrs. Anna E. Edrington at the residence of Mrs. C. H. Walker, 654 Sixth Street, tomorrow evening, when Mrs. E. E. Shepherd will make a report on the National W. C. T. U. meeting at Los Angeles.

Mayor Morris has received a letter of inquiry as to the whereabouts of one Otto Adel, formerly of Dayton, O., who came west for the benefit of his health about 17 years ago. The letter was written by Attorney Daniel Nevins, who says that Adel's mother died in Dayton recently and left him all of her estate.

The report of Horticultural Inspector J. P. Sorenson for the month of October shows that there were 21,000 trees fumigated and inspected in this county during the month. All diseased trees found were condemned and burned. A close watch is being kept on the nurseries for any appearance of blight or other infection.

The long delayed curved rails for the Market street turn out have at last been furnished, and the finishing touches are being put on the connections. For the present, the regular street railway tracks on Main and West Temple streets, will remain unconnected with the Market street track.

B. Schapiro, a prominent New York salesman, representing a large feather house, is at the Koyuk. He says the feather market is booming, prices being higher than ever before. It is nothing unusual for single ostrich feathers to sell for \$10 to \$20, and in especially selected goods the figure runs up to \$50.

The swampy places have been drained, and water has been got to the dry places. On the whole things are showing up better than was expected.
