SIX DAY GRIND FOR MOTORCYCLE

First Event of Kind to be started
Sept. 26 On Brighton Beach
Motordrome Track.

New York, Sept. 3.—The first six-day motorcycle race to be held in this country will take place on the Brighton beach motordrome track beginning at midnight Sept. 26, and ending at midnight Oct. 2. The recently organized association, which includes several makers of motorcycles, has announced conditions and is seeking contestants. For thrills and continuous excitement at a high rate of speed, the part of the persons interested in the event, it is believed, will consist with those who are most nervously inclined. That it will be even more exciting than the 24-hour automobile race is believed because there is likely to be many more contestants and because enthusiasm will prevail a whole week day and night, to work up to the peak of interest.

Experts declare that the most dangerous vehicle to ride is the most powerful, and this is borne out by the number of motorcycle accidents recorded at bicycle racing meets.
