NEW YORK, 9.—The Times has

this on the proposed Grant

reception in Illinois. It is known

when the General will reach Gal-

ena, the citizens have taken hold

of the matter of his reception with

great spirit and interest. A large

number of preparations have been

made to give him a hearty and

enthusiastic welcome. It is already

known that not only the people of

Illinois, but also those of the

adjacent States, are making

preparations to be present in

large numbers. Further than

this, the people from Dubuque

and Jackson counties, Iowa, and

Grant, Lafayette and Iowa coun-

ties, in Wisconsin, have signified

their intention to be present.

An enthusiastic meeting of the

citizens of Galena, irrespective of

political opinions, was held on the

purpose of making preliminary

arrangements for the reception.

Waaburns and Campbell have

visited the residence of Grant and

fixed everything in a state of

preparation to receive his train.

The announcement is formally

made from San Francisco that U. S.

Grant, Jr., is engaged to marry

Miss Flood, the marriage to be a

royal affair.

It is also said, upon what ap-

pears to be good authority, that

Adolph B. Borie, who was made

Secretary of the Navy ten years

ago, with the understanding that

Admiral Porter was to perform the

duties of the office, has been

made Grant's heir to his large es-

tate. In a letter to a friend at the

east, dated San Francisco, Sept. 28th,

Grant explicitly says that he ap-

proves all that has been said con-

cerning his intention to make Grant

his heir. He says, "I shall not

start out east before the 27th of

November and even then I do

not expect to go east of Chicago

before the holidays."

Washington special says: Col.

Varney Gaskins, a prominent Ten-

nessee republican now in this city,

says his party in that State is al-

most unanimous in desiring to

nominate Grant.

THE INDIAN WAR

Dodge's Perilsous March—Dispatches to Gov. Pitkin.

CHICAGO, 9.—Nothing new re-

garding the Indian war has been

received at headquarters this morn-

ing. The officers express great sat-

isfaction with the action of Capt.

Dodge and his colored troops, who

under no orders to do so. He made

a peculiar march through an in-

fected country with a party of men,

and forced his way through the

report that the Indians have been

killing the men and caring for the

women is discredited.
