New York, S.—In the legislature at

Albany to-day bills were introduced

for the abolition of the usury laws.

The report of the State Comptroller

shows the expense of the cattle last

year were \$314,373 in excess of receipts.

He recommends prompt legislation

for enlarging the capacity of the Erie

canal in order to retain transportation

of western products and successfully com-

pete with Canadian canals.

WASHINGTON, S.—The Credit Mobil-

ier investigating committee continued

the cross-examination of Alley.

Louisville, S.—Three passenger cars

of a train from Nashville ran off the

track at Belmont station last night.

Fifteen or sixteen passengers were

slightly bruised.

CONCORD, N. H., S.—At the Demo-

cratic convention to-day, James A.

Weston was nominated for governor.

HARRISBURG, S.—Governor Geary's

Message was submitted to the legisla-

ture to-day.

The State debt was reduced during

the year nearly two and a half mil-

lions, leaving the debt less assets on

hand, \$16,521,057. The Governor refers

to the debt of General Meade, and

recommends an appropriation for the

erection of a monument at Gettysburg

in commemoration of his services.

WASHINGTON, S.—In the Credit Mobil-

ier investigation committee this

morning, Alley said that up to Decem-

ber 1867, the Credit Mobilier shares

had no market value, but late in that

month, after Ames agreed on the basis,

the stock rose, bringing 100, in January

200, later 225. It appeared on the

books that Nelson, son-in-law of James

Brooks, was owner of certain shares and

was entitled to fifty shares more. There

was no connection between

Ames and Brooks relative to these 50 shares.

The removal of the office of the U. P.

R. R. Co. to Boston was a matter of

life and death to the company, to keep

it out of the clutches of Judge Barnard

and Fisk. Fisk wanted witness to set-

tle with him for \$100,000, but witness

said he would not consent for the com-

pany to pay him a single cent, saying

to Fisk, "If you want \$100,000, I will

give it to you, but not for this purpose."

Fisk replied it was a matter of dollars

and that if the company would not

give him the sum named he would

damage it a million, and Fisk did

damage it to the amount of several

millions by his ralls. Witness never

had any money, not a dollar, to use,

directly or indirectly, for the annu-

ment of the Secretary of the Treasury's

raising of interest on U. P. govern-

ment bonds, nor did he believe Ames

had the slightest idea of influencing

the legislation of Congress by allowing

himself to have stock.
