

yet we find the nation chained in parties and led voluntary captives at the will of aspiring demagogues. Electors cringe to the caprices of sectional leaders, and sectional leaders sell themselves for office and emolument. Thus the Chief Magistrate takes his seat, manacled with party policy, and too often the most sacred principles of Constitutional liberty are trodden under foot or forgotten.

Is it necessary that this should continue? Does the rabidness of abolitionists or pro-slavery-men enhance the glory of the nation? Are elements of political contention requisite to perpetuate the greatness of the Republic?

Let the contention end. Commit to the stern rigor of the plain statute the pirates who disgrace our flag, dragging the screaming African from his heart-stricken parents, and clouding with desolation the home of his childhood. Put an effectual veto to the ungodly traffic; and sweep from our seas their bloody canvas.

Then let the constitutional decision of our Supreme Judiciary be enforced. Let the sovereignty of the people predominate; and the voice of the people regulate their own domestic institutions. This principle will save the nation, and diffuse abroad peace and union.

Let those leaders be discarded who advocate principles and establish platforms, intended to burst the fraternal bonds which bind the North and South together, however specious their arguments and rhetorical their harangues. If the African is to be emancipated, let it be effected peaceably by his legitimate transfer to a soil adapted for his home and freedom.

We advocate, always did advocate, the encouragement of free labor. But we do not look to Europe for a sample of it. We do not advocate slavery; but oppose as vigorously the slavery of corruption, as the bondage of chains and ownership.

**NIGHT BRAWLING.**—On Monday night a noise and yelling were heard in East Temple street, between the hours of 9 and 10 p.m., made by four young men named Henry and James McCracken, James Wm. Burbage and J. P. Smith, citizens of this place. The police immediately went to arrest them, but they refused to be taken and attempted to resist. They were, however, with very little trouble, conveyed to the police station. Next morning they were brought before the Mayor, tried, and severely reprimanded for their improper conduct and fined from \$5 to \$15 each.—[CITIZEN.]

### LATEST NEWS.

The Bombay mail of the 25th October reached Suaz on the 8th of November.

Several scattering encounters with the rebels were reported, but nothing important.

Several actions had been fought near Lucknow, and a large number of the rebels destroyed.

The health of the British troops was very satisfactory.

TENTIA TOPEE had retreated from Esangur, first setting fire to the town, and entered Chindaree on the 9th October. A portion of his forces was afterwards encountered by General MICHAEL and entirely routed, with the loss of all their guns.

The plan of the campaign which was about to commence shows that Lord Clyde intended to surround and destroy by a military force the scattered bands of rebels.

Commercial accounts were favorable. Trade was active at Bombay, and prices had advanced. Exchange, 1s. 11½d.

**WINTER AT ROME.**—A letter from Rome dated Nov. 13, says:—"Winter has set in with great severity since Monday. It freezes, and the Sabine mountains are covered with snow. Such precocious cold weather was never before experienced at Rome. The same weather prevails in the interior of the Roman States. In the Northern provinces the severe weather has seriously compromised the oil crop by freezing the fruit on the trees. If the same effect has been produced on the coast of Tuscany and Piedmont, the price of oil, already so high, will become higher. Foreigners, whom the winter is driving from London and Paris are arriving in crowds.

**LEAVENWORTH, Nov. 9 per U.S. Express,** to Booneville, Nov. 12.

Favorable accounts continue to arrive from the Kansas gold regions. Seven men, of a Georgia company, took out five hundred dollars in five days. Upwards of six hundred wagons, bound to the mines, were met last week between Fort Kearney and the crossing of the Platte.

Spain is in a fair way of having her hands full. She is preparing an expedition against the Moorish pirates of the Riff—a formidable expedition, consisting, it is said, of 10,000 men; and another against Mexico, which will be a very expensive affair. Of the latter, the ships for the transport of troops have already sailed, except one.
