# Dr. Tanner and Apostle Cowley Ad.

Dr. J. M. Tanner addressed the students of the Latter-day Saints' university this morning on the subject of

schoolday judgments. He asked, Are the estimates we form of our schooldays likely to be accurate? The judgements of our school days are often faulty and unreliable. A case was cited within the speakers experience, showing that one man who is now able and prominent in this state was weak and obscure in school. Why this? Man is more than intellect. Are you sure of your own future by reason simply of your present standing? No, so heware of judging yourselves or others at this time. Especially be careful of passing judgment upon your fellow-students. Yet the Judgment of the schoolroom is important. It has to do with your friendships and yoru relations with one another. Therefore be generous in your sympathies and tolerant in your judgments. The more you can aid or uplift others, the faster you yourselves will grow. The higher your feelings for others, the

more exaited will be your own souls, Apostie Cowley said it was an inspiring sight to witness such a sight as was presented by the array of youthful es before him. He remarked that Dr. Tanner had really made application of the Savior's lajunction, "Judge not that ye be not judged." Thise young people represent the concent ation of the labors, the wealth, the sac-rifices, of their parents, who have toled and waited in order to make possible this splendid opportunity for education that prevaiis among the young people of today. The lesson of apprecial n ought to be well learned by those who attend such an institution as this. parents of the young people that come here, ought not and surely will not be disappointed. It is not mainly those who are the most brilliant, but those who are most diligent and who are most devoted to principle, that make the lasting successes. Your education in this institution is, in its nature, sym. metrical. It deals with spiritual as well as temporal things, and exemplifies the doctrine and words of our Lord and
