Gold from Nome.

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 22 .- The steamship Nome City arrived in port at 11 o'clock this morning with 185 passengers and \$24,000 in gold dust from Nome. On Aug 14, the purser says, a four-masted schooner with white fore-FAYS. top masts was seen on the beach of Unimak island. The Nome City attempted to speak to her, but no one was around. The schooner was resting easy on her side and apparently was not damaged to any great extent. The name could not be distinguished. The seventh day of the trip the steamer Centennial was met about 600 miles out from this port.

Czar May Offer to Intervene.

Brussels, Aug. 22.-The Independence Belge today prints a dispatch from Copenhagen which says: It is reported in Russian circles that the czar has decided to broach South African inter-vention to Emperor William and Presi-dent Loubet. He considers the time pportune for friendly mediation. The paper adds, under reserve, that he czar, during his stay in France, will receive Mr. Kruger in private audience and obtain from him a direct statement of the Boer position, with the view of formulating a plan for action.

METHODIST DELEGATES.

Ecumenical Conference Promises to be a Most Successful Affair.

New York, Aug. 23.-American dele-gates to the Methodist ecumenical conference have begun to arrive in Lon-don and register their names at the conference book room, City Road, says a dispatch to the Tribune. Several American bishops are expected and a large number of ministers. Bishop Harizell who takes a strong pro-Eng lish view of the Boer war, has returned from Africa to attend the conference and Bishops Hurst, Vincent and Ham-liton will also be present when the first meeting is held early in September. Wesleyan Chapel, City Road, will be the chief center of conference work, but several meetings will be held in St. James Hall, Discussion will run on practical lines of work, characteristic of Methodism, such as the liquor traf-fic, gambling, effective preaching, mis-sions, education and modern indifferentism, and there will be special de-bates on biblical criticism and Protestantism versus sacredotalism. Hugh Price Hughes, the most eloquent Wes-leyan preacher in England, will be kept away by ill-bealth. R. W. Perks, Yerkes's associate in the reform of underground London, will take an ac-tive part in the organization of the conference and Sir Henry Fowler will pre-side over one of the most important meetings. A series of supplementary meetings will be held in several provincial towns after the close of conference.
