## LOCAL BRIEFS.

Trustees Re-Elected.—At Wednesday evening's annual meeting of the Presbyterian church, C. C. Spooner and Wade Lounsbury were re-elected trustees.

War on House Fly.—The state board of health is preparing to make war on the house fly this spring with renewed vigor. Secy. Beatty calls attention to the fact that there was a case of typhoid fever in a family of a dairy proprietor not long ago, then traveling between the sick room and the milk room, so poisoned the milk with fever germs carried on their bodies, that an epidemic of typhoid was the result.

Injured in Chemical Laboratory.—A very painful accident occurred in the chemical laboratory of the high school yesterday when Richard Robinson and Prof. Clark were injured by the application of a mixture of an explosive mixture in a test tube. # TAKING STEPS FOR CAPITOL ELECTION

Governor Spry Issues First Notice of Forthcoming Vote By People.

RAISES STATE TAX ONE MILL

Fifteen Years Will be Required to Raise Money Needed for The Building.

Notices of the special election on June 1, to determine whether the people of Utah want a state capitol was issued yesterday by Gov. William Spry. In order to secure a state capitol the taxes will have to be raised 1 mill for 15 successive years.

The state capitol was provided for by four bills which were passed by the legislature. These bills provided for a commission to be composed of the governor, speaker of the house, and the attorney general and four others to be appointed by the three state officers. Another act provided for the issuance of bonds amounting to \$200,000 for the construction of the capitol building. A third provision gave the state board of loan commissioners authority to loan the money to the capitol commission. Then the other bill provided for the increasing of the tax levy 1 mill.

In the statement issued by Gov. Spry yesterday, he said:  
"Utah has reached a position of dignity among her sister states, and in the maintenance of that position it is eminently proper and fitting that she should have a state capitol. Our immediate sister states, not more richly favored than Utah, are now possessed of capitol buildings which are comfortable, commodious, and dignified monuments to the states for which they stand."

"Business judgment, above all else, demands that we erect a capitol building at once. The state is paying annually a large rental for quartering the various offices of government. Consider with this the inconvenience of having the state offices scattered throughout the city, making the transaction of business between the several departments cumbersome and slow, and you have advanced the strongest possible argument for the immediate erection of a capitol building."

"No state in the Union is favored with a more ideal site for its capitol building than Utah. Within the past few years I have shown a letter from a leading architect of the United States in which he says that on the occasion of a visit to Salt Lake City some years ago he made a visit to the capitol grounds and has given the question of a capitol building for that site some thought. The result of that inspection and the subsequent consideration convinces him that the Utah capitol site is wonderful in its possibilities of treatment from an architectural viewpoint. The streets running to the capitol grounds from various directions of the compass, the prominence of the city and the magnificent view from the city combine to make it susceptible to the most wonderful architectural effects."
