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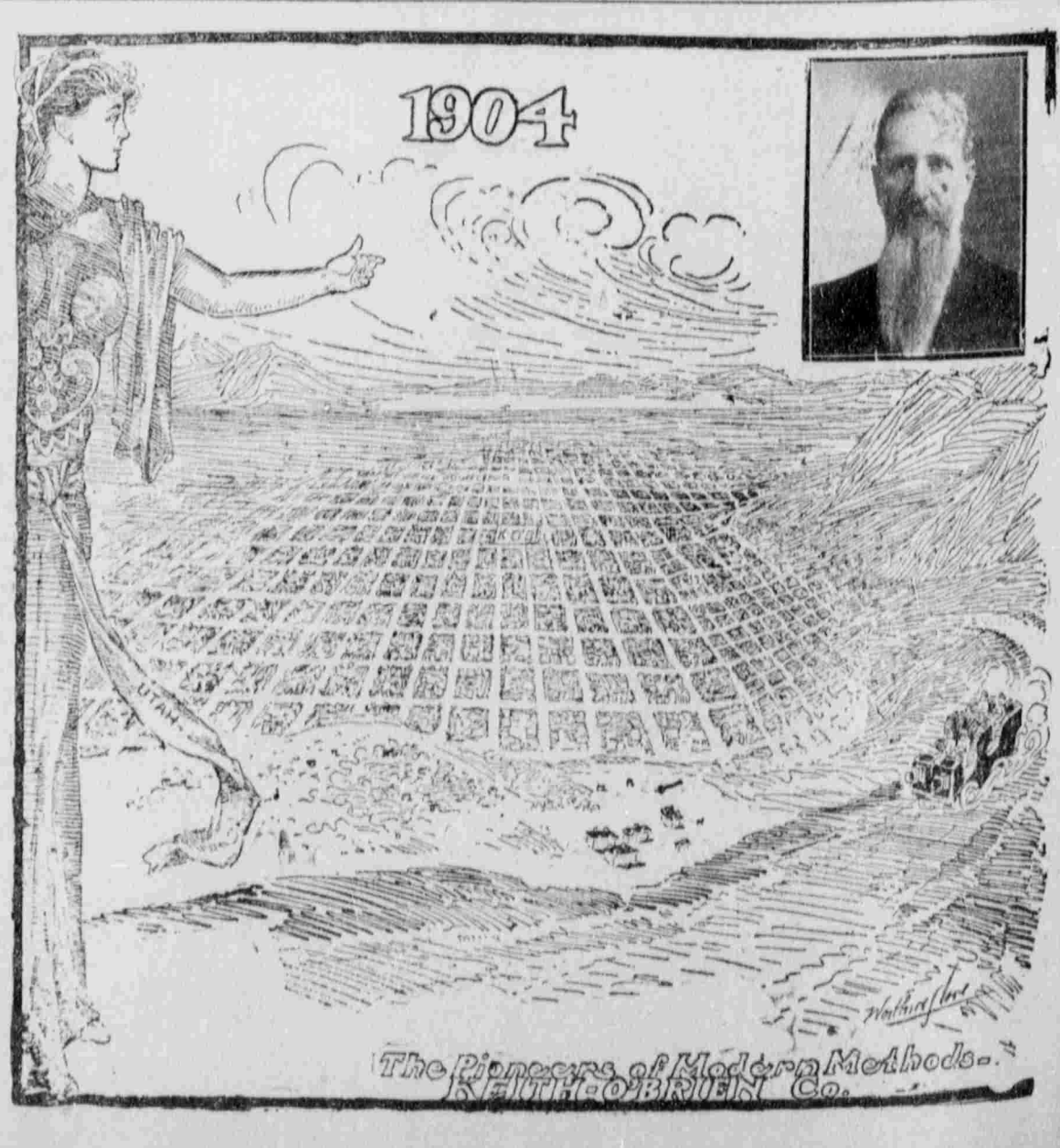

The Tenebris lace wheels provide fascinating fancy work, and they are cleverly used in the illustration to form the yoke, little bands of lawn—which one can purchase already cut and folded in the shops—being deftly inserted to emphasize the design. The yoke is round and sets well over the curve of the shoulder, a backing of white chiffon adding much to its softness and daintiness. The blouse is applied in shallow shirred tucks, the oscillating stitch of the modern sewing machine making these mathematically precise and firm. Two insertions of valenciennes pass around the sleeves and blouse, the latter being puffed softly into a paquin belt of shiny black leather.
