Batteries and Runaways—Thatcher's Hand Going to Potomac—Accidentally Shot.

LOGAN, April 13.—Walter Hesse was arrested on Saturday last for a battery committed on Frank Burr. Hesse afterwards wished to withdraw the complaint, but the commissioner would not allow him to do so unless he first paid the costs, amounting to \$11.30. The case was postponed.

Zeladov Coltrin was arrested on Wednesday morning for a battery committed on a man named Gey. The case will be tried in Commissioner Goodwin's court on Friday. Coltrin claims that he supposed from Gey's actions that he was about to draw a revolver, and therefore struck him.

Several runaways occurred on Sunday and Monday. Joe, a mare was driving east on Sunday and stopped on Third street at the postoffice. When he was about to get into the buggy the engine became frightened and started to run. Joe was struck by a luggy wheel and knocked down. The horse ran around on Main and Second streets, and was headed into Tomlin's stable. One of the buggy wheels struck the side of the doorway and was broken.

Joe Earl also had a runaway, and it appeared for a short time as if he would lose his life. One of the horses out of his cart, and the wheel soon followed it. Earl was thrown off and his foot was caught in the angle between the shaft and the trace at the lower end of the shaft. The horse started to run, and Earl's chances looked slim. He had dropped the line when thrown off, but when he realized that he was caught, he managed to catch the reins again, and after going about half a block turned the horse into a lane and stopped it. He was not badly hurt.

A boy was driving a team on Third street, when one of the horses raised its head off on the end of the neck yoke. The horse took fright and both of the animals were soon running at the top of their speed. The boy jumped, and in turning a corner the reins slipped over and was broken. The horse became excited and ran with a wild, excited look. The harness was badly broken.

The funeral services of David Purdie, the young man who suicided last Saturday night, were held on Tuesday, at the family residence in the second ward. The house was filled with sympathetic friends, and the services were a long one. The floral offerings were numerous and beautiful. The casket was placed in the hearse, and at the time he committed the crime, he was in an apparent case to be particularly despondent.

The Thatcher open house band is going to Potomac on the evening of the 24th. The people of that town appreciate the music made by this fine little band, which gave a concert there some years ago. The new open house at Potomac will be used for the occasion.

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Alexander Smith, a boy who lives in the fifth ward, was out on Sunday last hunting, in company with a boy named Parr. As some money Smith was accidentally shot by Parr. They were about twenty-five yards apart when the accident occurred. The lower part of Smith's abdomen and his legs were perforated in forty different places, and while his wounds are not dangerous, they are painful. Many of the shots penetrated quite deeply. All that could be recovered without probing too far were picked out by Parr.

Feeding the Eggs in Winter.

The agricultural office of the New York World advises those who raise turkeys during the winter season to feed the laying hens as follows: Having secured warm, comfortable quarters for the birds, feed with well balanced egg producing ration. Round grain in variety, plenty of green food, oyster shells, ground bone and an occasional sprinkling of charcoal comprise an excellent bill of fare for the laying hen. The foods that contain albumen, such as oats, wheat and corn meal, are required for the production of the white of the egg. Limes in some form must be given to insure proper shell formation and a sufficient amount of carotene food, such as carrots, fat meat, etc., to sustain the vigor of the bird and add elements necessary to the formation of the yolk of the egg. Growing boys, which is rich in egg producing food, may be advantageously fed in winter by chopping it fine, soaking and mixing with lard.

Finest green vegetable food is essential, hence the advantage of plenty of cabbage, turnips and potatoes. Birds inclined to fatten really ought to be fed sparingly of carbohydrate food; therefore the ration repeatedly given against an excess of eggs. Best results are gained from oats when ground. Wheat is one of the very best grains for laying hens. In winter excellent results are gained with warm mash of the grain, boiled potatoes and moist scraps. Milk is excellent, either sweet or skinned by skimming. The birds ought always to be supplied with gravel or other sharp, gritty material with which to grind their food. This is especially essential when the birds are on limited rations.

Vermont's Abandoned Farms.

The Vermont state board of agriculture reports that during 1901 there were sold in that state 1,154 farms, of which 92 were of the class known as abandoned farms. Most of the purchasers of these farms were, as was the case in Massachusetts, people from here in the state who believed that the farms, properly handled, will make better homes than could be secured in the far west and bring in a fair living.

Convicted of Embroidery—Guilt of Illegal Liquor Selling—Jordan Ban Revision—Diphtheria.

PROVO, April 13.—Thomas Harding was tried yesterday before Justice Wedgwood on the charge of embroidery, and found guilty. The testimony showed that on March 25th Harding was in company of the Provo local Co. of this city, and on that day he did appropriate two silver dollars given him in payment for goods by a customer, said coins having been marked by the moon keeper and were found in his possession. No witnesses were placed on the stand for the defense and the case was submitted without argument, but it is understood that on Monday next, the day set for Harding's sentence, Mr. Thompson, his attorney, will raise the question of the validity of the complaint, which was drawn by Mr. Joseph Van Gies and Fred Simpson. Harding has withdrawn his plea of not guilty to the charge of burglary, liquor selling, and selling of goods of guilty, in the district court. They will be sentenced on May 1st.

The argument for a new trial in the Jordan case has been postponed until May 1st. By mutual consent, the motion for a new trial in the case of Samuel Bennett vs. the Utah Range Railway company was overruled.
