

FOREIGN.

MONTREAL, 13.—A terrible fire is raging in Victoria Square. Loss already over a million dollars and not yet under control.

There is a terrible fire to-night in the Clendennings' block, Victoria Square. It originated in Miller, Son & Co's., book bindery and stationery store, and extended to the following premises, all of which are now gutted: Greenshields Son & Co., dry goods; McIntyre & French, dry goods; Clendennings' stores. Losses, Millers \$150,000, Greenshields \$250,000, McIntyre & Co., 400,000, Clendennings buildings and stock \$550,000. Insured in all the leading English and Canadian offices for three-fourths of the values.

At 12.50 the fire rages as fiercely as ever, the water power at the beginning not being sufficient to cover the upper stories of the buildings where the flames had the strongest hold. Three steam engines, all that are in the city, were brought into requisition but they seemed useless in conquering the fire. The loss will not be so heavy on McIntyre & French as at first believed, the wind having changed in time to partially save the premises and stock in the northwest end of the block.

The fire is now on the Craig Street side and from all appearances the whole block, except McIntyre & French's will be reduced to ashes, but the flames will not be allowed to extend further. The origin of the fire is unknown.

ALEXANDRIA, 14.

The soldiers are openly asking for the deposition of the Khedive, and declaring they will, if necessary, oppose Turkey herself. Not only women and children are leaving the country, but men with large material interests in Egypt are begging passages and leaving their property behind. Many large capitalists are arranging to leave Egypt permanently, not in panic, but after calmly calculating the cost of such a step.

Cairo, 13.—The work of exciting the population is complete; papers are distributed among the populace summoning them to be ready at any moment. The Italian Consul has issued a notice to all Italians to quit the country.

Marseilles, 13.—The Mediterranean squadron is ordered to be ready to proceed to Alexandria.

BERLIN, 14.—In the Reichstag to-day, Herr Richter asserted that Bismarck's speech in the Reichstag yesterday in support of the tobacco monopoly bill was nothing more than an electioneering harangue addressed to the electors of the Diet. Richter declared that the time had arrived to say to Bismarck: This far and no farther. The Reichstag, he said, would perform a national act in rejecting the tobacco monopoly which was a foreign institution and contrary to the principles of German life.

ST. PETERSBURG, 14.—Gen. Ignatieff's downfall must be attributed to the four-fold coalition of the Germans, the Jews, the court party and holy synod represented in the councils of the Emperor by M. Pobedonosteff. Germany has never forgotten Gen. Ignatieff his supposed connivance with Gen. Skobeloff. All the Imperial family influence has been brought to bear against him. The Jews, meanwhile, combated him by depreciating Russian funds; the Court detested him because he held it in check, and the holy synod bore him a grudge for his refusal to second the Sabbatarian movement in Russia. It is thought that Count Tolstoi, Ignatieff's successor, will be a mere man of straw. The real governors of the country will be Count Dashloff, Minister of the Court, M. Pobedonosteff, the president of the holy synod, and M. Katkoff, director of the Moscow Gazette, who, it is safe to assume, will be all-powerful at the Ministry of the Interior. Ignatieff's overthrow does not materially improve the political situation. His partisans will dwell on the number of malcontents in Russia, while Count Tolstoi will certainly not diminish it. The new minister is the incarnation of everything despotic. He is disliked in St. Petersburg, and abhorred in the provinces. His appointment, therefore, cannot but deal another blow at the popularity of the Russian government.

LONDON, 14.—The Prince of Wales, Duke of Edinburgh, Duke of Albany, and nearly all the members of the government voted with the minority in the House of Lords yesterday, on ordering the bill legalizing marriage with deceased wife's sister to its second reading. The bulk of

the conservatives and all the bishops voted with the majority.

MONTREAL, 14.—The recorder is determined to stop the demoralizing practice of using blasphemous language on the public streets. He quoted the law which imposes a penalty of three years in the penitentiary for such an offense, and has ordered the arrest of all persons contravening that law in the respect alluded to.

The steamer Pera from this port for Great Britain foundered off Cape Rare. The steamer Lake Manitoba, which passed the Father Point inwards, had on board the captain, officers and part of the crew of the Pera, who were picked up in little boats; the other boats of the Pera are yet unheard from. She had the following cargo: 230 tons phosphates, 24,495 deals, 204 horned cattle, and fed, and 10,000 feet of lumber. The ship and cargo were insured. She had a crew of 32 and eight cattle men. Ten persons are yet missing.

LONDON, 14.—In the Commons, Dilke, under Foreign Secretary, denied that the Egyptian troops were disaffected. He said that Dervish Pasha was confident that he would be able to maintain order. He declined to answer further questions as it was impossible to explain the situation until the papers were published. Sir Henry Wolf, conservative, moved the adjournment of the House as a protest against the reticence of the government. In the debate which followed, Wolf condemned the association of England with France. Gladstone said he lamented what had been said concerning France, when she solemnly declared that she would labor loyally and heartily with England. All the powers he said were co-operating heartily with England. The Sultan is in complete harmony with the powers and Germany had most strongly urged the Porte to accept the conference. Gladstone said on the necessity of using the instrumentality of Turkey, that the British policy was the maintenance of all established rights.

ALEXANDRIA, 14.—The Governor has issued a proclamation declaring that the arrival of the Khedive and Dervish Pasha is a guarantee of order and the citizens have consequently resumed their avocations. A Turkish frigate has arrived, and the Khedive received diplomatic officials and several leading Europeans.

BERLIN, 14.—A liberal journal speaking of the resignation of Ignatieff says: There will be a feeling of relief that one of the most dangerous and unprincipled intriguers against the peace of Europe has been put aside.

ROME, 14.—In view of the wishes expressed in Garibaldi's will, the minister of public instructions presented in the Chamber of Deputies a bill, for which urgency was voted, for the purchase of crematory apparatus with which to cremate the body of Garibaldi. The papers publish an agreement of the members of Garibaldi's family to give the Island of Capra to the Italian nation.

VIENNA, 14.—Austrian Lloyds sent two and the French Messageries Maritimes sent seven large steamers to Alexandria for the purpose of removing Europeans who desire to leave the country. Upwards of 1,000 refugees expect to arrive at Trieste on Sunday.

CAIRO, 14.—The panic is increasing and the exodus of Europeans continues. The offices of European control and several banks are closed. The English and French Comptrollers General have gone to Alexandria. All of the officials belonging to the Control obtained leave of absence. Probably all branches of Egyptian administration, including the caisse of public debt, will be transferred to Alexandria. It is reported that Tienkiewicz, French consular general, has asked to be recalled.

In California wool very little has been done, but Northern Spring brought 30 @ 35 cents. The Boston buyers are now reluctant to pay these prices.

The Supervising Architect of the Treasury received fourteen proposals for a site for the public building at Denver, at prices ranging from \$1,000 to \$10,000, but has made no selection.

The President has nominated Samuel B. Axtell of Ohio, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of New Mexico; and R. M. Daggett, of Nevada, for United States Minister to the Hawaiian Islands.
