PRISONERS ESCAPE THROUGH CHARGED WIRES

New York, July 1.-That a heavily-charged criss-cross of electric wires from the principal prison wall restrains the many military prisoners at Fort Hancock, on Sandy Hook, has come to Ight by the escape of two prisoners. The convicts were recently taken to "ort Hancock from the federal prison at Leavenworth, Kan., to finish their terms. "You are the man," Logan said to Chung Sin today, "who told me to take the trunk downstairs carefully. There was another silm fellow with you in the room; the same fellow that came over to the office half an hour before to give me the order to call for the trunk."

The Chinaman's voice broke and he shook as if in fear as Logan was led out, still positive in his identification. Chung was not kept waiting long be-fore he had another visitor—this time Martin Luria, the chauffeur who drove a Chinaman and a trunk from a Harlem laundry to the chop suey restaurant in Newark on the morning of June 10. The police had adopted the theory that Chung Sin might have paid the fare and not Leon Ling. But Laria could not identify Chung Sin, and stMy believes it was Leon in his taxicab.
