ON THE RACE TRACK.

Second Day of Grand Circuit Meet at Hartford—Suffert Won, 2:00.

Hartford, Conn., Sept. 8.—The second day's racing in the fall Grand Circuit meet at Charter Oak park was devoid of any unusual features. Weather and track conditions were most perfect, although the air was a little sharp at intervals.

2:10 trot, three in five, purse \$1,500—Concluded from yesterday—Dr. Strong won the third, fourth and seventh heats in 2:10, 2:11, 2:12. McKinley won the fifth and sixth heats in 2:10, 2:11. The Roman won the first and second heats in 2:10, 2:11 and was displaced in the fifth. Caspian, George Muscovate, Neil Gwynne and Edgewood also started.

National Trophy Shoot.

Sea Girt, N. J., Sept. 8.—New Jersey took the lead at the very beginning of the national trophy match this morning and remained at the head of the list of competitors upon the conclusion of the first day's shooting in the great military rifle contest today.

The firing today was 200, 500 and 600 yards, constituting the first half of the match. The winner tomorrow will be at the 800, 900 and 1,000-yard ranges. The New Jersey team score was 1,361 out of a possible 1,600.

WILL STOP BOXING.

St. Louis Chief of Police to Confine Ticket Sale to Members.

St. Louis, Sept. 8.—Chief of Police Kelly announced that beginning today he decided to stop boxing at the West End club and other local resorts. He came to this conclusion after a conference with Circuit Attorney Folk.

Chief Kelly says: "If boxing is to continue in this city, all the clubs will have to provide proper halls, having exits enough for the absolute safety of the spectators and confine the sale of tickets to members."

Late Sporting News.

Philadelphia, Sept. 8.—Joseph Riley, aged 23, a local bantam-weight pugilist, is in a critical condition at a hospital from a boxing match last night with Griffith Jones of New York, at the Southern Athletic club. Jones is under arrest. After the bout Riley fell in his dressing room and has since remained unconscious. Special policemen have been assigned to the case with instructions to arrest all concerned in the bout. The physicians have been unable to determine the exact nature of the pugilist's injuries.

ROCK SAND WINS.

London, Sept. 8.—Rock Sand, this year's Derby winner, ridden by Maher, won the St. Leger stakes at Doncaster today. William Rufus was second and King Edward's Mead was third. The king witnessed the race.

NATIONAL RIFLE MATCH.

Sea Girt, N. J., Sept. 8.—The pick of the riflemen from ten states of the Union, the District of Columbia and three branches of Uncle Sam's fighting service are striving here today to capture the coveted trophy provided by Congress in the national match. Today the marksmen began the second half of the competition, each man at each of the longer ranges, 800, 900 and 1,000 yards. All other target work at Sea Girt is suspended today, the national match having the right of way. Hundreds of spectators are at the firing point carefully following the progress of the contest. Six of the teams will receive prizes. The team finishing in the lead will take the national trophy and \$500 in cash, the second, the Hilton trophy and \$300; the third team the "A Soldier of Marathon" trophy and \$200; the fourth, fifth and sixth teams respectively, \$150, \$100 and \$50. A medal will be presented to each member of each of the prize winning teams.

Steamer Uninjured.

Baltimore, Md., Sept. 8.—The British steamer Etrichdale, Captain McKenzie, bound from Baltimore for Baltimore, which went ashore in the channel yesterday afternoon, was pulled off by a tug and arrived in port today apparently uninjured.

After Murderous Burglar.

Ashland, Ky., Sept. 8.—Sheriff Heene, with a posse, is hunting a burglar who yesterday afternoon broke into his home in his country home before daylight yesterday. Colonel Williams, discovering the burglar ransacking his house, attacked him with a sabre. The burglar shot him and escaped.

Beavers and Machen.

Washington, Sept. 8.—One of the persons indicted yesterday by the federal grand jury in connection with the postal investigation is George W. Beavers, formerly chief of the division of salaries and allowances. It is understood that the charge is conspiracy.

Unveiling in October.

Adams, Mass., Sept. 8.—The date of the unveiling of the McKinley memorial statue has been fixed for Sunday, Oct. 3. The principal speakers will be ex-Secy. of the Navy Long, Gov. Bates and Lieut.-Gov. Curtis Guild, Jr. The statue is one of the first to be erected to the memory of President McKinley, and is the result of public subscriptions.

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regard to the situation in Syria. Re-doubling arriving here from the Arab desert say the Druses are in arms and fears are entertained of a massacre in Lebanon. Official reports from Beirut show the growing gravity of the situation there. Another Christian was killed yesterday. The Turkish soldiers are making common cause with the Mussulmans during the attacks on Christians, and a number of houses have been pillaged. One French shop was completely destroyed. The French residents, becoming terrified at these depredations, have abandoned their homes and sought refuge at the French college, where between 400 and 500 refugees are now gathered. The American naval commander, it is asserted in the dispatches received here, proposed to land marines at Beirut, but the foreign consuls believed the step inadvisable at this time, as it might lead to an increase in the excitement prevailing and cause a crisis. The val of Beirut proved himself to be weak and incom-

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petent to deal with the situation, and therefore Nazim Pasha, the val of Syria, was ordered to assume the direction of affairs in Beirut. Nazim Pasha, who has already arrived at his new post, is displaying great energy. The consuls express the hope that he will be able to stem the disorder. The nearest French warship to Beirut is in the Gulf of Volo, Greece, but unless Nazim Pasha speedily restores order and completely safeguards French citizens, France will act decisively by dispatching warships from Toulon.

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
