President Jordan of Stanford Writes Letter About Their Relationship.

eral states have had upon their busi-ness. Not only have the changed con-ditions of the last 12 months cut deeply into the profits formerly derived from this source, but on long runs liquor can be sold for only portions of the dis-tance, and the company is constantly in danger of prosecution for law-break-ing through carelesaness of employee. Inquiry at the offices of the superin-tendent in this city develops that of late years the Pullman company no longer runs dining cars, and only in certain parts of the west continues to run buffet cars in which liquors are sold. Diners were given up because the railways prefer to handle that class of service themselves, and buffets are not operated in this part of the country. So no liquor is sold at all by the Pull-man company in this or adjoining states. How President David Starr Jordan of Stanford university views the pres-ent situation in college athletics, and what he considers the underlying causes, is well illustrated in a letter received from him by a friend in Salt Lake. It deals with the domination of the athletic interests of certain small un-versities over the faculty and re-genis, and says that "college presi-dents who think that athletics can be used in advertising are likely to be led off their base and the smaller the college and the more eager for advertising, the smaller the men like-ly to be at the head of it.
